"One of the things we didn't do last year that we should have done was let Marc Black carry the football more," Coach Gene Stallings says.



Black had a good spring training in which he combined football with track, throwing the javelin. He finished second in that event in the SWC meet that the Aggies won.


One of his biggest thrills to date was A&M's 20-13 victory over Army at West Point last year. Black's father is an Army colonel working in the state department.






