Gene and Jim meet again

Saturday's game with Texas Tech will be a reunion for the coaches of the two schools. Coach Gene Stallings was an assistant coach for Paul Bryant at Alabama, and Coach Jim Carlen of Tech was an assistant under Boddy Dodd at Georgia Tech during the same time. One of Stallings' main duties while working with the Crimson Tide was to scout the games of the Georgia Tech Yellowjackets. He handled the scouting reports on the Jackets for five seasons. Carlen is known to be a great admirer of Dodd and Stallings and the offensive style of the two is similar. "They execute well and run very few plays," he said, and added that that was tradition of Tech teams under Dodd. But defensively the Raiders don't pattern after GT. Georgia Tech is more of a stunting team, he said, nothing that the Raiders do normally stunt much.

Associate athletic director Marvin Tate represented A&M Monday at Memorial services at Wichita State University, held for 30 persons including 13 members of the Shocker football squad—who died in plane crash in the Rockies Mountains Friday.

Trainer Billy Pickard says the hard hitting and hustle the Ags showed on the recent road trip against LSU, Ohio State and Michigan were key factors in the Ags' coming off the trip with only a few minor injuries.

"When you stand around is when you get hurt," Pickard said. "We were really hitting people. Against Ohio State we were standing around but we just were making a lot of little mistakes when we moved."

The world-record clocking of 1:21.7 in the 880 yard relay by the Aggie foursome of Donny Rogers, Rockie Woods, Curtis Mills and Marvin Mills has been officially accepted as a world record by the International Amateur Athletic Association at its yearly meeting. Ollan Cassell, track and field administrator for the National AAU said the IAAF approved the record which was set last spring at the Drake Relays in Des Moines, Iowa, at their meeting in Stockholm.

As of noon Tuesday, 36,000 tickets had been sold for the Texas game, according to Athletic Business Manager Wally Groff.

Groff said that ticket sales were going briskly for the conference opener, and both upper deck sections are sold out. The rest of the tickets are for the end zones, north and south, and on both sides, Groff said.

Knobhole tickets for youths of high school age and under will be placed on sale Saturday at 8 a.m. for \$1.

A crowd of around 40,000 is expected for the 7:30 p.m. contest on Kyle Field.

Falcon QB flying high

NEW YORK (AP)—Bob Parker of undefeated Air Force has displaced Stanford's Jim Plunkett as No. 1 in total offense among the nation's major college football players.

Plunkett, who was third in passing in last week's statistics released by National Collegiate Sports Services, fell to fifth as Parker and three other players tied for first.

Parker, a 5-foot-11, 175-pound senior, took over the lead with 1,217 yards in 150 plays. Plunkett had gained 1,080 yards in 166 plays.

Parker, defending champion John Reeves of Florida, last week's leader Leo Hart of Duke and John Read of Pacific area in a four-way tie for passing honors.

In four games each has completed 73 passes for a game average of 18.3. Plunkett has completed 72 passes in four games for an 18.0 average.

Ed Marinaro, Cornell junior who was runnerup in rushing in 1969, took the lead in that category, averaging 205.5 yards a game following a 260-yard game against Lehigh last Saturday—a major college season high.

Gary Kosins of Dayton, who trails Marinaro in rushing on an

average of 156.7 yards per game leads the nation's scorers with 10 touchdowns for an average of 20 points in three games. Marinaro scored six touchdowns for two-game average of 18 points.

Marv Bateman, Utah junior took over first place in punting with a 48.2 yard average on 12 punts.

Rifle team wins

The A&M Men's Rifle Team has won its first two matches beating Texas A&I and Stephen F. Austin University.

At the Sept. 26 match, A&M won with 2,566 points to A&I's 2,369. A&M beat Austin University 2,565 to 2,466 on Oct. 2. These scores are out of a possible 3,000.

Oilers sign Gary

HOUSTON (AP)—The Houston Oilers signed 12-year veteran offensive guard Ken Gray Tuesday after a knee injury hospitalized Tom Regner, four-year regular from Notre Dame.

Gray, a free agent, was waived earlier this year by the St. Louis Cardinals and retired. He took the Oiler physical and passed Tuesday and will sign a contract Wednesday.
