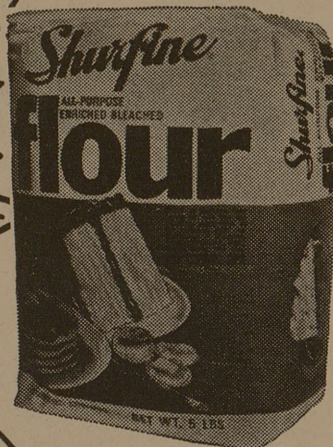

Nuclear chemist to lecture here

Dr. James W. Cobble of Purdue University, a noted nuclear chemist, will speak at Texas A&M Feb. 15 under sponsorship of the Robert A. Welch Foundation, announced Dr. A. D. Suttle Jr., vice president for research.

A 1966 Guggenheim Fellow, Dr. Cobble received the E. O. Lawrence Award this year from the Atomic Energy Commission.

His Texas A&M topic is "Chemically Bound Neutrons." The 44-year-old scientist has major research interests in nuclear and physical-inorganic chemistry, with emphasis on thermochemical properties of elements and their compounds.

A&M begins study to aid San Antonio

Texas A&M has initiated a study to determine resident and tourist attitudes toward development of San Antonio's River Walk area.

The study ties in with a beautification program started in 1963 along the downtown section of the San Antonio River.

Dr. Clare A. Gunn, project director professor of tourism-recreation development in Texas A&M's Recreation and Parks Department, said numerous San Antonio residents will assist in the study.

Gunn said the bulk of the research activities will be performed by Robert E. Couch and David J. Reed.

Couch is an instructor in the Recreation and Parks Department, and Reed is an assistant professor in the Department of Recreation and Park Administration at Arkansas Polytechnic College.

beginning Tuesday.

Topic for the twice weekly, five-week series is "Estimation Based on Grouped Samples."

H. O. Hartley, institute director, said Dr. Kulldorff is head of the Institute of Mathematics and Statistics and dean of the Faculty of Mathematical and Natural Sciences at the University of Umea, Sweden.

The lectures are scheduled from 4 to 5 p.m. each Tuesday and Friday for five consecutive weeks. The lecture room will be announced later.

Anyone interested is invited to attend. Hartley said the only prerequisite is a basic knowledge of statistics.

Police Training staff gains two instructors

Two instructors have been added to the Engineering Extension Service's Police Training Division, announced Chief Instructor Ira E. Scott.

Scott said his staff now is at full force with seven men.

The new Texas A&M employees are Russell Coleman, who comes to A&M from the Orange Police Department, and Kenneth Robinson, formerly a Randall County Sheriff's Department deputy.

Police Training Division personnel conduct on-campus and extension courses for law enforcement officers, justice of the peace organizations and private security officers.

Research group gets \$15,000 in new funds

Theoretical research in the area of shell analysis being conducted by a Texas A&M aerospace engineering group headed by Dr. James A. Stricklin will be continued with \$15,000 in additional funding from Sandia Corporation, Albuquerque.

The award to the Texas Engineering Experiment Station was made through the Texas A&M Research Foundation.

Stricklin said the researchers will seek the analysis technique best suited for solving the plasticity problem with finite element methods.

Working with the principal investigator are Walter E. Haisler, assistant professor, and Dennis Deel, graduate student in aerospace engineering.

Bricklaying trade to get boost

Texas A&M's Engineering Extension Service has begun a new program aimed at upgrading the state bricklaying apprentice training.

Coordinator for the Texas State Bricklayers Apprentice and Mason Training Program is Gilbert B. Cook of Dallas.

Cook said the objective is to start apprentice programs to "increase the number of apprentices on a well balanced basis year after year to meet the needs of industry."

He said the average Texas bricklayer is 45 years old, extremely high for a growing state.

Currently there are seven related classes and seven vocational schools teaching bricklaying. Related classes are those where the apprentice spends a regular work week on-the-job and four hours each week in classes conducted by the union.

Class of 1940 plans weekend reunion

Members of Texas A&M's 1940 class will hold their 30th anniversary reunion this weekend.

Mrs. Olive DeLucia of the Association of Former Students of office reports approximately 150 class members will assemble for

the Ramada Inn activities.

Scheduled to attend the reunion is Air Force Lt. Gen. Jay L. Robbins, commanding general, Tactical Air Command Headquarters, Langley Air Force Base, Va.

General Robbins' son, Robert, is a senior at Texas A&M and commands Squadron 6.

Activities include a dinner and social Friday night, brunch from 10-11:30 a.m. Saturday featuring the Singing Cadets, attendees at the A&M-Arkansas football game and after game dinner and social.

University to set up new extension centers

Texas A&M will establish five new agricultural research extension centers across the state as local support and funds become available, announced the institution's board of directors.

Board President Clyde Wells Granbury said centers are proposed for the Amarillo, Dallas, Fort Worth-Denton, Stephenville, Corpus Christi and Uvalde areas.

Wells said the board also has directed university officials to explore the possibility of establishing centers at other locations as circumstances warrant and the needs to support further agricultural development become apparent.

Research and extension centers are the most comprehensive of the various types of agricultural installations operated throughout the state, explained A. R. Landecker, acting Texas A&M president.

Four such centers are now in operation at Beaumont, Lubbock, Overton and Weslaco. A fifth center is being established at San Angelo.

The centers are jointly operated by Texas A&M's Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

2 Engineering faculty write paper

Dr. Wilbur L. Meier, associate professor of industrial engineering, and J. C. Helm, instructor, are co-authors of a paper to be presented at the 38th national meeting of the Operations Research Society of America being held in Detroit this week.

Title of the work is "Simplified Development of Problem-Oriented Algorithms."
