out what plans and aspirations they have for Texas A&M.

"There is more genuine love for this institution here than at any other place I've been," he added.

Texas A&M's new president has a busy schedule for much of the month. Wednesday he will meet with officials at Tarleton State College; Thursday, he will meet with a state Senate subcommittee on agriculture to explain A&M's program plans; Friday he will be in Austin to meet with Gov. Preston Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and other state officials.

Saturday he plans to attend the A&M-SMU game in Dallas. Sunday through Tuesday he will be in Washington, D.C., attending a national meeting of the land grant and state universities organization. Later this month, he will visit A&M Clubs in Amarillo, Dallas, San Antonio and Houston.

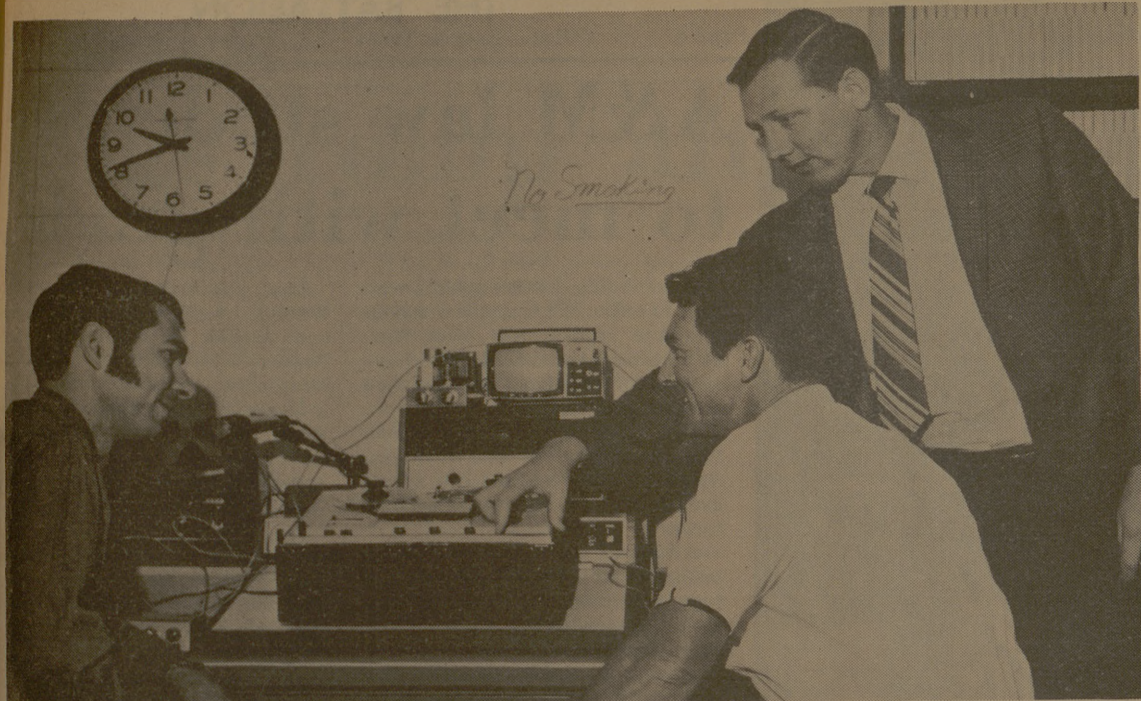
Williams has known about A&M for years, both because of its national reputation and because of his term as Coordinating Board commissioner.

"I like the programs, I like the role A&M has announced and has followed," he said. "A&M is, in my opinion, just simply a cut above the other land grant schools."

The new president also said:

"I think ROTC is one of the fundamental, basic programs at Texas A&M, and under no conditions will I entertain any argument with people who would want to close it out."

"I think reasonable and rational student assistance in university affairs is called for. Student membership on university committees should be an automatic thing."

## Educational media center open to faculty, students

A&M's Educational Media Center has expanded to the point it can serve more students and faculty members, reports EMC Director W. H. (Bill) Lowry.

The Center was established by the College of Education in September, 1969, as a support operation. It currently has a technical repair shop for audio and visual equipment, duplicating department, audio-visual aids production section with part-time artist and a media department to loan instructional aids and equipment.

All the facilities are located in Building D, a two-story, 4,000 square foot wood structure behind the A&M Press.

Lowry said all types of cameras and equipment can be checked out for one week by faculty and students, with first consideration given to College of Education needs.

Last year EMC operated with part-time personnel only, but this fall there are two full-time employees and six part-time.

Lowry said the four departments are designed to handle almost any faculty or student needs in audio-visual communications.

The center has over \$20,000 invested in equipment, Lowry estimated.

Part of the media department is a sound-proof recording booth with the capability of mixing up to five sound sources at one time through a mixer box.

Lowry reports the center is upgrading equipment and services and expects to begin producing software for the College of Education.

This year each EMC department will produce one series of audio-visual information.

Currently three undergraduate classes and two elementary education art classes use the building. All student teachers tour the facilities and receive instruction on classroom visual aids production.

There are complete laboratory facilities for preparation of visuals, with the only charge for materials used.

A pickup and delivery service is available to the College of Education.
