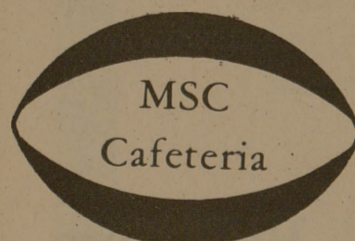

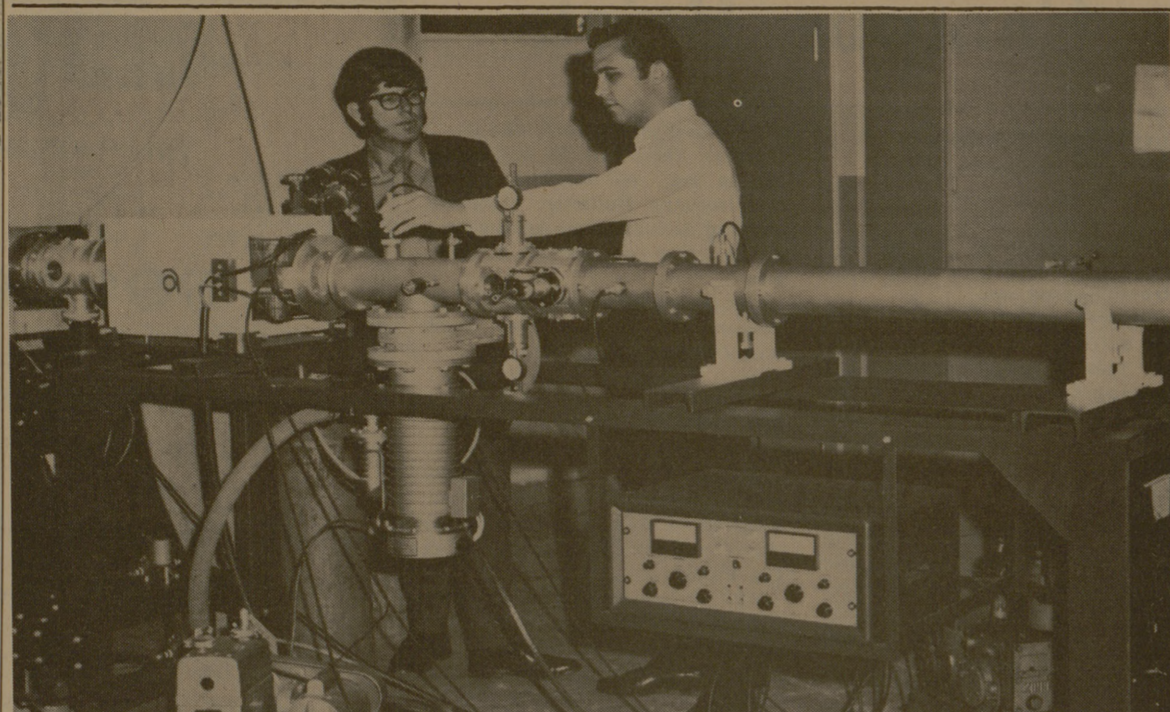

An Austin firm, Accelerators Inc., has provided particle-acceleration equipment and operating funds for establishment of a new electrical engineering laboratory at A&M.

The new facility, the Ion Implantation Laboratory, will be part of the Institute for Solid-State Electronics in A&M's Electrical Engineering Department.

Dr. W. B. Jones, department head, said the company donated a 150,000-volt ion accelerator and is furnishing the funds for its operation on an annual basis. The accelerator is valued at \$40,000.

"Accelerators, Inc., has provided us an extraordinary opportunity to conduct a variety of experiments involving design of semiconductors," Dr. Jones said.

Institute personnel will have unrestricted use of the accelerator, Dr. Jones explained, but will share with Accelerators, Inc., any patented devices resulting from such research.

Dr. Norman A. Bostrom, president of the accelerator firm which has become the leader in producing ion-implantation systems for the semiconductor industry, said his company was particularly attracted by the solid-state research effort at A&M.

He said the new facility is well suited to research and development of importance to the advance of ion implantation as an industrial process.

Dr. J. S. Linder, head of the new Ion Implantation Laboratory, said the accelerator will be used primarily to inject impurities into semiconductor materials. Injection of materials by this method, he added, is the basis for a new technology for the fabrication of semiconductor devices and the synthesis of semiconductor materials.

The accelerator functions much as a high-speed rifle in ion implantation, Dr. Linder explained. It is utilized to implant a variety of ion species into semiconductor substrates, thereby altering the atomic structure and the chemical composition of the material in a highly controllable manner.

He said the machine also can be used to study damage and subsequent repair in semiconductor materials.

Highway officials meeting will hear Singing Cadets

The mood-inspiring Singing Cadets will perform Wednesday in Houston at the annual American Association of State Highway Officials meeting.

About 3,000 conferees will be in Houston. The Singing Cadets will perform before an expected 1,800 at an AASHO family night banquet and party at the Shamrock Hilton Hotel.

Director Robert L. Boone said the Singing Cadets' outing, second of four next week, will be the glee club's first before a national organization.

The Cadets also will sing in Houston Dec. 8 at the national convention of the American Farm Bureau, two days after completing their seventh Miss Teenage America Pageant in Fort Worth.

Boone said the 63-voice group will do "basically a patriotic program with some swingers thrown in for balance" for the highway officials. Accompanist is Mrs. June Biering.

The Houston performance gets

the wheels turning on more than 50 road engagements for the Singing Cadets during 1970-71. The group, composed of civilian students and Cadet Corps members and undergraduate and graduate students of virtually every college and major at A&M, has already made several campus appearances for conferences, short courses and meetings.

They will also sing next week on campus for the Texas Dairy-men's Conference and Saturday at the Class of 1935 reunion in conjunction with the A&M-Rice football game.
