Railroad strike leader issues halt order to avoid heavy fine

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nationwide railroad strike leader C. L. Dennis said Thursday night he had ordered his men back to work after a federal judge threatened fines of \$200,000 a day against the union.

Dennis, at a news conference after U. S. District Judge John H. Pratt found the union in contempt of court, said his back-to-work order should end the crippling strike.

However, Dennis earlier had released copies of telegrams from union members insisting on continuing the strike.

Dennis said the Labor Department had assured him of speedy

negotiations under the special act of Congress that ordered the railroads to pay an immediate 13.5 per cent pay hike to nearly 500,000 workers involved and work out the rest in collective bargaining.

The special law, enacted by Congress and signed by President Nixon in the early morning hours after the strike had already begun, ordered the workers back on the job until March 1.

Dennis said he personally believes "the trains will be running by midnight."

The White House earlier had ordered priorities for air, ship and truck shipments of emergency cargoes stranded by the walkout.
