Virus may be reason behind last week's surge in absences

"The virus has been responsible for illness throughout the community," he said.

Fred W. Dollar, director of Food Services, put much time and money into an extensive study of food conditions, but determined that no illness could have resulted from the meals served in Duncan of Sbisa Dining Halls, Nelson

"At first we thought it might be the result of physical exertion causing stomach cramping," he said, "but later it was clear that the illness was medical; probably a virus which spread rapidly and could hit anybody."

The cases reported to the hospital were evenly distributed through all classes, in both the corps and civilian areas, Nelson

Twenty-five students were detained in the hospital for observation for a short time Wednesday.


