Broad powers of the lieutenant governor, said CCSL, are a "hindrance to the Senate developing leadership of its own choosing." Powers include appointment of committee chairmen, assigning bills to committees and casting tie-breaking votes.

States getting the best rankings were, in this order, California, New York, Illinois, Florida, Wisconsin, Iowa, Hawaii, Michigan, Nebraska and Minnesota. Texas ranked 45th in ability to

control its own activities, 43rd in the use of available information. 36th in accountability to constituency and 17th in being represent-
