Meeting laws need Pres change, House told 'N

AUSTIN (AP)-The public has elected representatives voted a right to know what motions are made at closed meetings and how their elected representatives vote on them, Rep. Dave Allred of Wichita Falls told a House committee Wednesday night.

Allred said his bill amending the open meetings law was needed to clarify some questions that have arisen.

Meetings of governmental bodies may be closed to deal with personnel, real estate or security matters.

Under Allred's bill notice of meetings of public bodies would have to be posted in advance even if they were to be entirely behind closed doors.

And the minutes of the closed meeting would have to be posted within three days after the meeting.

The minutes would include only the motions that were made and how the members of the governmental unit voted on them.


