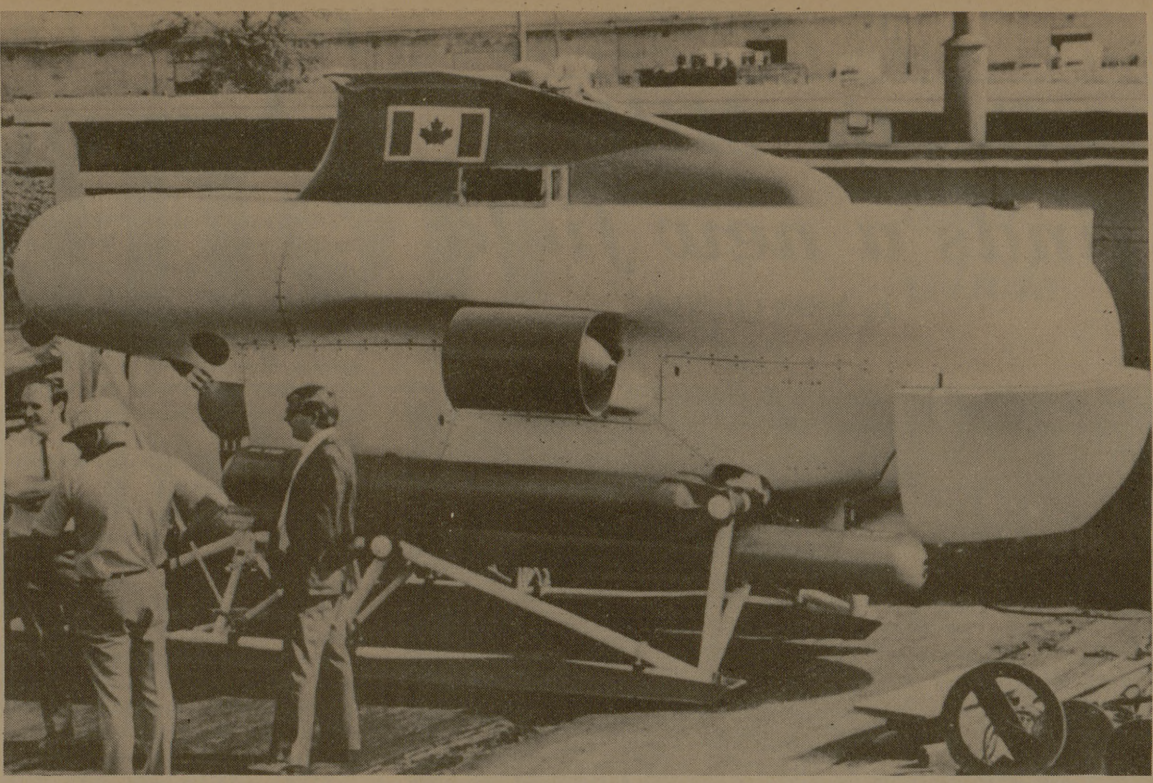
Awards in the aerospace engineering national honor society competition are a certificate and \$100 honorarium.

Journalists to discuss student press

Student press problems, space-science news and the future of magazines are subjects for eight communications experts addressing a journalism conference here Friday.

Approximately 230 representatives from 15 colleges in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana begin assembling Thursday night for the one-day 41st annual Southwest Journalism Congress and Student Press Club meetings at the Ramada Inn.

Apollo 13 lunar module pilot Fred W. Haise Jr. will speak at the awards banquet Friday night and show photography from the aborted six-day mission last year.

Separate meetings are scheduled at 2 p.m. on student press problems. Thompson, former director of Detroit University publications, and several student editors will discuss problems with the Student Press Club. Dr. Danielson, a noted journalism researcher, will meet at the same time with faculty advisors. He is dean of the UT School of Communication.

Mount and Aynsworth address the second general session at 3:45. They will discuss the future of magazines.

A joint business meeting concludes the program at 4:30. The awards banquet begins at 7 p.m. Students are scheduled to hold a dance following the banquet and faculty advisors will be entertained informally at the Leabo home.

Astronaut Haise is no stranger to journalism. He started as a paperboy in Biloxi, Miss., worked on the high school paper and while in high school covered sports for the Biloxi Daily Herald.

He majored in journalism at Perkinson Junior College, serving as sports editor his freshman year and editor-in-chief his sophomore year. He also was the school's public relations man.

The Korean war interrupted his studies and he became a Marine Corps pilot. He later graduated from the University of Oklahoma with a degree in aeronautical engineering.

High schoolers to compete here Saturday in drill meet

Fifteen high school ROTC drill teams will compete Saturday in A&M's third Junior Invitational Drill Meet.

Teams from Bryan, Dallas, Houston, Killeen, Bellaire, Laredo, Galveston, San Antonio and Austin will vie for a 43-inch master trophy that resided in Laredo and Houston for the last two years.

Laredo's Martin High School Singing Cadets and the Milby High Muskets of Houston will be in the competition. They were the 1970 and 1969 champions, respectively.

Competition in inspection, basic and fancy phases will begin at 10 a.m. on the main drill field in front of the Memorial Student Center, announced John Hamilton, president of the sponsoring Association of Former Fish Drill Team Members.

The Fish Drill Team will perform an exhibition drill after the last high school team has completed competition marching. Presentation of first, second and

third place trophies in each phase and the master trophy will follow.

Each team will complete all meet requirements in succession. After inspection, the unit will report for basic marching, then the fancy phase, completing the sequence on side-by-side competition areas in about 30 minutes each.

Junior invitational meet judging will be by Fish drill team advisors and members of the Association of Former FDT Members. The association is sponsoring the meet with the Commandant's Office and Departments of Military Science and Aerospace Studies.

Teams in the competition are Allen Academy of Bryan; Bryan Adams and Lincoln High Schools on Dallas; Houston's Robert E. Lee, Stephen F. Austin, Lamar and Milby High Schools; Killeen High School; Nixon and Martin High Schools, Laredo; Ball High, Galveston; Robert E. Lee and South San Antonio; and Reagan High of Austin.
