He came to A&M from Clark University, where he taught chemistry 13 years, serving the last three years as department head. He also has served as visiting scientist at Lawrence Radiation Laboratory, Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution and Brookhaven National Laboratory. He retains appointments at Woods Hole and Brookhaven.

The 45-year-old chemist earned his undergraduate degree at Kalamazoo College and master's and

Sugihara was named a John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Fellow in 1961-62 and a Gustavus Swift Fellow in 1950-52.

He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and served as a member of the National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council Committee on Waste Disposal from Nuclear-Powered Vessels in 1958. Survey of Nuclear Chemistry in 1964 and Low Level Contamination of Materials in 1965. He also is a member of the American Chemical Society, American Physical Society and Sigma Xi.




