Assassination attempt made on ambassador

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) -A bomb set to assassinate U.S. Ambassador Emory C. Swank was sent careening on a bicycle into his limousine Tuesday but it failed to explode and tumbled harmlessly to the street.

Police said the riderless bicycle, carrying a 13-pound plastic charge hidden among loaves of bread behind the seat, was shoved from an alleyway as Swank rode

Cambodian police said the bicycle-bomb was designed to explode on impact with the limousine, but only bounced off and fell to the street.

The defective explosive was discovered when Swank's Cambodian guard stopped and ordered military police to inspect the bicycle and the bread-laden basket behind its seat, police said.

Embassy spokesmen said Swank continued to his office unaware of the attempt on his life. He learned of the assassination try only at midmorning, they

Police sources said the bicycle was pushed into the street by two young men on motorcycles who escaped down the alleyway and onto another street. They were described as being Chinese or Vietnamese in appearance.

Police said they also are seeking a young bread salesman who delivered the bomb to the alleyway under the bread loaves and disappeared shortly before Swank's black limousine came

The sources said a full report on the incident will be placed before Marshal Lon Nol, Cambodia's leader.

Russia claims Chinese military prepares for war

MOSCOW (AP)-Russia said today the Chinese army is militarizing all aspects of life in China in preparation for war with the Soviet Union.

The newspaper of the Soviet defense ministry, Red Star, said "Mao Tse-tung and his entourage are establishing in China their new system of power, with the army ruling the roost." The army, the paper said, has

"the task of ideological-political education of the population, the task of the practical implementation of instructions of the 'Mao headquarters' in the political, economic, cultural and social spheres.

"They make no secret of whom one should be prepared to fight against. The army and the population are inoculated with the idea of the existing 'threat from the north'."
