HELP US BOOST A&M TO A VICTORY

Senate investigator attacked, probing organized crime in Texas

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — Police guarded a hospital Wednesday to protect a Senate investigator who was beaten and robbed of valuable papers while on a mission here to probe organized crime.

William B. Gallinaro, 44, described as a crack investigator for the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, was in good condition and under observation, officials said.

Police Chief E. E. Peters said representatives of the subcommittee were expected here shortly. The FBI was looking into the case.

Gallinaro's purpose here was shrouded in secrecy, although he told a newsman he was investi-

gating organized crime. Spokesmen in Washington declined to disclose the nature of the probe.

His investigation came a few weeks after published reports of growing Mafia activities in Texas.

Police said Gallinaro was attacked when he returned to his hotel room Tuesday night. His assailants stole papers which he described as valuable and rendered a dictating machine inoperable, officials said.

"Only papers pertaining to his work for the subcommittee were taken," a Washington spokesman said. The contents were not disclosed.

The spokesman said Gallinaro arrived Monday and held an in-

terview Tuesday afternoon. Details were not disclosed. One published report said he met with several persons in a probe of Mafia-linked crime.

Returning to his hotel room Tuesday night after dinner, he was knocked unconscious, kicked and beaten, officials said. No money or other valuables were reported stolen. The room was ransacked. Police said there was no sign of forced entry.

The San Antonio News said it learned Gallinaro's investigation dealt with stolen stocks, bonds and securities used as collateral for large loans.

Police and federal officials said they were unaware of Gallinaro's visit until after the attack.

Police at first withheld details. A hospital spokesman said officials were ordered to disclose nothing on Gallinaro. "He's not even carried on our patient list printout," the spokesman said.

Gallinaro, described as a "New York Sherlock Holmes," joined the subcommittee last February. Before that, he was a supervisor of the special service squad of the U. S. Marshal's office in New York, where he lives.

From 1969 to 1971, he was assigned by Atty. Gen. John Mitchell to the New York State Legislative Committee on Crime. Spokesmen said Gallinaro, father of two, has received more than 30 citations for his law enforcement work.

Advisor says nation will gain from environmental cleanup

HOUSTON (AP) President Nixon's top environment advisor, diverging from the views of Commerce Secretary Maurice Stans, said Wednesday the nation would gain a net profit from environmental cleanup despite the costs.

Russell E. Train, chairman of the President's Council on Environmental Quality, described as nonsense the views of "those who see environmental policies as a threat to economic growth and to jobs."

He made no mention of Stans, but Train's rebuttal to the unidentified "those who" came close on the heels of a speech made in Houston last Oct. 26 by Stans, who suggested that efforts against industrial pollution were being pressed too fast and too hard.

Stans spoke at a conference of the Financial Executive Institute; Train's remarks were to another businessmen's group, the National Soft Drink Association. Stans cautioned against what

he called ecological hysteria and said the nation must say to itself: "Wait a minute, here — what are our priorities . . . can we really get there from here . . . how do the benefits compare with the costs?"

Train said, "There are those who see environmental policies as a threat to economic growth and to jobs. There are those who charge environmentalists with responsibility for stopping technological progress, with blocking important projects, and generally retarding progress."

"There are those who claim that concern for the environment is being carried too far . . . who make a practice of describing environmentalists as wild-eyed extremists . . ."

"Like most such generalizations, this is nonsense. It could be dangerous nonsense if we permitted it to distract us from the real needs of our time."

"Obviously, some projects have been held up and even stopped for environmental reasons," Train said, but rather than being irrational or irresponsible, he added, such actions showed a long overdue attention to environmental considerations.

Turning to economics, Train said "industry air and water-pollution control costs will generally be less than 1 per cent of the value of shipments" and the environmental control would, itself, provide business opportunities.

"There should be no significant impact on total employment because of the effort to control pollution," he said.

Indeed, said Train, "a poor environment is, in the crudest terms, costing us money . . . If we balance the over-all costs and benefits of our pollution control program we would find a net economic gain."
