Maravich, a native of Aliquippa, Pa., took over as LSU head coach prior to the 1966-67 season. During his six seasons he compiled a 76-86 record.

His first season was the worst in Tiger basketball history. That team won only three games, while losing 23.

But with the addition of his All-American son Pete to the varsity roster the following year, LSU posted a 14-12 record in 1967-68, 13-13 the next year, and 22-10 in 1969-70.

The Bengals were 14-12 last year and last Saturday the Tigers finished their current season at 10-16.

Maravich's contract extends through April 1973. Maddox said the university will honor the commitment.


