Recorder Sandy Eichorn (Jr-Ed C&I)

This year I have worked actively on the Student Senate as junior senator from the College of Education. Those committees I participated on include: Academic Excellence, Student Insurance, Welfare and Student Senate Awards. I sponsored the com-
