Both relay teams were disqualified, costing A&M its only first, the mile relay. Although they ran a 3:14.8, Wayne Mills elbowed near the end of the second lap. The sprint relay unit was ruled out for exchanging the baton out of the designated zone. It was the first time since 1961 that an A&M track team was shut out at the conference meet, getting no
