Dr. James A. Stricklin of A&M has been selected by the National Science Foundation to attend a research symposium on American-Japanese research at the University of California-Berkeley in

NSF is sponsoring the leading 20 U.S. and 20 Japanese scientists from universities and industry for the one-week program beginning Aug. 14. The symposium is entitled "The Second U. S. Japan Seminar on Matrix Methods of Structural Analysis."



But, part of the blame must be placed upon the students themselves. Some didn't know that just because they hadn't gone here before they wouldn't have card packets printed up. One bewildered Aggie was even overheard asking what day classes would begin.

All that can happen now is for both sides to recuperate, gather forces again and make plans for second session registration. It all takes place again July 13.

Good luck to all concerned-you'll need it.


