High school workshop

Young journalists meeting this week

A&M hosts 130 high school journalists and their sponsors this week for the Journalism Department's annual High School Publications Workshop.

The program began with registration at 10 a.m. Sunday with a full slate of activities planned through noon Friday. All participants are housed in the Memorial Student Center, according to Howard Eilers, TAMU photography professor and workshop chairman.

Eilers said the workshop includes divisions for newspaper, yearbook and photography interests.

The students are involved in practical application of journalism skills, have a full evening social program and hear a number of special speakers.

Among the speakers is Henry Holcomb of The Houston Post Austin Bureau. Holcomb spoke Tuesday night in the Architecture Auditorium on the contrast between professional journalism and school journalism.

Other special lectures include Fred Koger of Dallas, vice president of Taylor Publishing Co., "The Disappearing Yearbook;" Harold E. Massey of Austin, executive secretary of the Texas

Association of Secondary School Principals, "The Administrations View of the Role of Student Publications in the School Community," and Mrs. Evelyn Dunsavage of Dallas will explain how critical services can help school publications.

Mrs. Dunsavage also heads the newspaper division of the workshop. She will be assisted by Elizabeth Hurley of Pampa and A&M journalism students Roger Miller and Tom Cone.

D-Eon Priest of Taylor Publishing Co., Houston, heads the yearbook division. He will be as-

sisted by Taylor Publishing Co. representatives Don Watson and Max Webb, and Mrs. Kathleen Leabo of College Station, wife of Journalism Department Head C. J. Leabo.

Ernie Leister of Taylor Publishing Co. and Eilers will direct the photography students.

Eilers pointed out the newspaper students will produce a daily newspaper. The yearbook group will experiment with a new style this year, producing a com-

bination news magazine-yearbook under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Lang of Kerens.

Don Williams of the A&M Educational Psychology Department planned a social program which includes a hamburger fry and fold worship service Sunday night, a pizza party Monday night, a swimming party at the A&M Research Annex tonight, wiener roast in Hensel Park Thursday night, and noon luncheon banquet Friday.

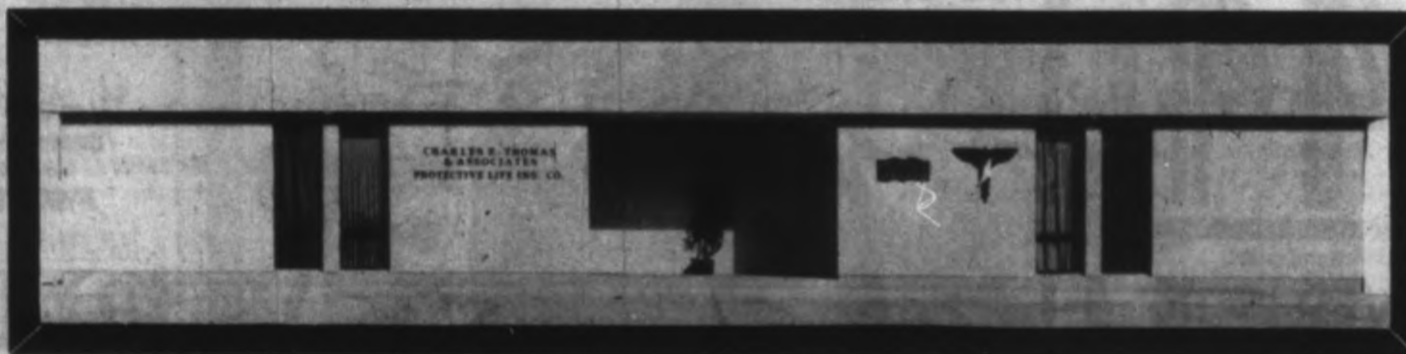
