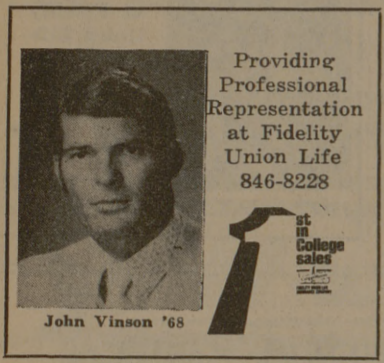


Lyons, Miller win top honors at Army ROTC camp



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A&M cadets Leslie C. Lyons of Honolulu, Hawaii, and Robert J. Miller of Brecksville, Ohio, finished first and second among 2,400 at Army ROTC camp this summer at Fort Riley, Kan.

Lyons and Miller were among 18 TAMU cadets who won special recognition for exemplary performance and leadership potential at the Fifth U.S. Army camp, announced Col. Thomas R. Parsons.

The commandant said achievements of cadets at the 1972 camp set a new standard of excellence

exceeding that of several years.

Parsons noted that 14 cadets are in the U. S. Army Ranger School at Fort Benning, Ga., and 70 who also attended the Riley camp earned paratrooper wings in separate training at their own expense at Benning.

Colonel Parsons will attend the ranger school graduation exercises Aug. 10 as the Fifth Army commander's representative.

Lyons and Miller were among 18 TAMU cadets winning platoon leadership awards given to the

cadet with the highest leadership potential index score of each platoon.

A building construction major and member of Company C-2 in the Corps of Cadets, Lyons received the Camp Commander's Outstanding Cadet Award. Miller's award, also based on military proficiency and leadership score, was the Camp Commander's award for the outstanding cadet of his cycle. The encampment at Fort Riley consisted of two cycles.

Lyons also won the American

Legion award, presented to the most outstanding cadet of each battalion.

Coy R. Morris of Waco received the Army Commander's leadership award for the highest leadership potential index score of each cycle.

A similar award for the top-scoring cadet of each company was taken by Lyons, Morris, Paul D. Workman of Laredo and Duane E. Byrd of Randolph AFB.

They received platoon leadership awards along with William

D. Walker of Dallas; Charles L. Kroll, Lake Jackson; Arthur S. Saldana, Farmers Branch; James W. DeLony, Pasadena; Steward K. Hawkins, San Angelo; John F. Landgraf, Silsbee; Jeffrey R. Murray, Austin.

Also, James F. Kelly, Sinton; Max L. Knight, San Antonio; James P. McEver, New Orleans; Robert W. Cooper, De Ridder, La.; Werner C. Krueger, Cuero, and Richard A. Hoyt, Shaw AFB, S.C.

Lyons and Miller's awards con-

sisted of a Spartan U. S. savings bond certificate each. The Legion presentation medal, ribbon and \$250 prize received a \$50 ribbon.
