Dr. Donald E. Farris of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Dr. James I. Mallett of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service found that the returns on investments in farming were substantially below the average for the rest of the U.S. economy from the mid-1950's through 1960's.

During the 1960's farm corporations earned about 45 per cent as much as the average U.S. corporation, the economists said. The rate of return on investment for manufacturing was over three times that of farm corporations, not including asset appreciation.

Farm corporations having reeipts over \$1 million made the highest returns in agriculture, but still had returns well below manufacturing corporations with comparable receipts.

Net income from farming as per cent of total assets declined from over 9.7 per cent in 1950 to about 5 per cent in 1970, the economists reported. The return on assets in agriculture, which includes income for operator labor and management, was less than 6 per cent in all but two years of the 1960's. Other segments of the U.S. economy average approxi-mately 10 per cent and do not include labor income.

Disposable per capita income did increase from slightly above half of nonfarm income in 1950 to above three-quarters in 1970. To obtain this increase, farm assets, such as land, equipment and livestock, had to rise much faster than assets of other businesses.

Average assets per farm increas-ed nearly 500 per cent over the two decades.



Farmers experience wide swings. in income from year to year and the rate of return varies widely among types of farms, the report said. Generally, the rate of return and stability of income is greater for farms producing products with some type of price and production
