

A&M Rugby Team To Face LSU On Saturday

The two-time state champion Texas A&M Rugby team faces its first challenge of the 1972 fall season Saturday afternoon in Baton Rouge against the LSU rugby team.

At 1 p.m. on Gerry Mander Field the A&M second team will face the LSU second team, and at 2:30 p.m. the A&M first 15 faces the LSU first squad.

In this, the first formal meetings of the two schools, A&M will meet two very quick and experienced sides. LSU is known for its fine style of rugby it can play. Nevertheless, last year at the Falstaff Invitational Tournament the A&M second squad defeated an LSU team composed of both first and second teams by a score of 22-16.

The powerful A&M first team

goes into Saturday's encounter with most of last year's key players gone due to graduation.

Members of last year's second team have filled in the openings in practice for the past three weeks. Saturday will be the acid test of their unity.

Starting at fullback will be Brett Holland with Judel Quixhall and John Gunn at the wings.

Randy Harjo and George McCarroll will round out the back line at outside and inside centers, respectively. The fly half will be manned by Gene Anderson and at scrum half will be Donny Robertson. Both men are new at these positions and have adapted well.

Finishing out the front row will have Steve Stouran back from last year's team at the right

prop position along with George Alden at the hooker position and Larry Gallego at the left prop position.

Mark Anthony and Jim Goulding are the backs. Aaron Cahoon, Bruce Mills, and Giles Ford finish the scrum with Cahoon and Ford returning to their wing forward positions and Mills at the number 8 position moving up from the second team.

The A&M second team has a lot of potential with a lot of inexperience. Five of the starters in Saturday's game have never played a minute of competition.

The centers are David Untersall and Steve Beckendam. Veteran Art Saldana will be at the fly half position giving some continuity to the young back line, but the scrum half is still to be determined in practice this week.

Batt News Summary

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.—An attempt by China and the Soviet Union to place their proposal for the ouster of American troops from Korea on the agenda of the 27th General Assembly failed Wednesday.

By a vote of 16 to 7, a 25-nation steering committee voted to recommend postponement until next year of any debate on the question of divided Korea.

WASHINGTON — A federal judge ruled Wednesday that the Democrats could name Maurice Stans as a defendant in their \$3-million civil suit against the Republicans.

In the civil suit, Stans, chief political fund-raiser for President Nixon, is accused by a Democratic party official of financing the June 17 break-in of the Democratic headquarters in the Watergate Office Building.

WASHINGTON — A major consumer-protection bill was passed Wednesday by the House in a 318 to 50 vote.

The measure is aimed at protecting the public from unsafe products used around the home or schools. However, an attempt to add guns to a list of items that could be regulated by a proposed federal commission was defeated.

SAIGON — North Vietnamese troops stiffened their resistance Wednesday to government efforts in Quan Ngai Province, while South Vietnamese forces scored victories on the Quang Tri front.

Enemy soldiers have already captured Ba To and now threaten two more district towns in southern Quang Ngai Province.

BROWNSVILLE — A La Raza

Unida candidate for the Texas Senate said Wednesday he objects to what he terms "manipulation" of Chicano pupils during appearances Friday by President Nixon at Rio Grande City and Harlingen.

Ricardo J. Molina of Brownsville, who opposes Democrat Raul Longoria of Pharr and Republican G. G. Garcia of Mercedes, voiced the objections in a news release.

MEXICO CITY — Ten agents with the cleanest record in the Tamaulipas state police history were sent to Nuevo Laredo Wednesday by the state governor in a renewed attempt to halt drug traffic.

The entire state police force in this border city was fired or reassigned Tuesday because of their connection with local mafias who control drug smuggling into the United States.

Drug traffickers have sunk Nuevo Laredo "in the worst chaos ever," said a spokesman for Tamaulipas Gov. Manuel Ravize.

HOUSTON — The president of the Texas Association of Insurance Agents said Wednesday competitive auto insurance rates can only increase the cost of auto insurance.

"Open competition sounds great," said Luther B. Stover, "but does it work?"

Stover told a Houston Kiwanis Club meeting that "actual experience with these rating plans in other states show that when this principle is applied to insurance, the result has been different."

NORTH BERGEN, N.J.—Sen. Edmund Muskie joined George McGovern on the campaign trail Wednesday as the South Dakota

senator called for programs to insure that Americans are financially secure in their old age.

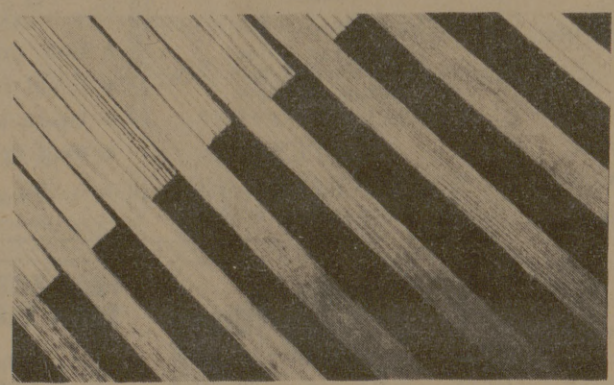
