According to Green, work is presently under way on biological control of fire ants through the use of phermones and hormones. Survey techniques by remote sensing and the use of infrared photography to detect infested areas are also being eval-The cooperation of all agricultural producers, landowners, nurs-

erymen, soil-moving contractors and others engaged in transporting any of the regulated articles is essential to suppress the spread of fire ants, emphasizes the en tomologist.


