

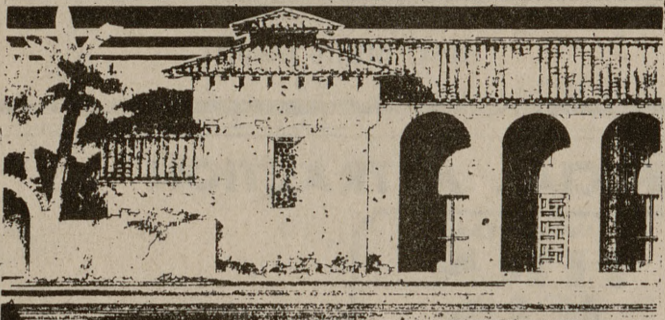

Les Williams: World's Shortest Defensive End

"He may be the shortest defensive end in major college football."

Meet Les Williams. He's a 5-10, 195-pound senior and a returning defensive starter for the Arkansas Razorbacks. The above description, taken from the Razorbacks' 1972 Press Guide, might create instant problems for some players, but not Williams.

His solution is simple. "I'm a crazy man on the football field," Williams says. "Being short may hurt some, but I hope to think that I can out-quick and out-smart the offensive guy most of the time."

"I love to go out there and play rough and clean," he added. "I guess you could call it the

killer instinct — I love to get out on that field and hit."

That's Les Williams, a player called "a leader" by his teammates and "a fierce competitor"

by his coaches. He refers to football as his No. 1 love, but admits that he would also like to play in the school band. Football is a serious matter, he says, but at

the same time, he exhibits a light-hearted, sometimes humorous air when talking about the game.

"I just love to get out there and practice and have a good time and really get in there and fight," he said early this week as the Razorbacks began preparations for Saturday's game against Texas A&M.

Williams started every game of the 1971 season at defensive end, although he had never played the position before last year.

"I made the big switch last year, and it wasn't easy," he

said. "I was a linebacker in the past, and I remember going back to cover receivers instead of rushing the passer when I began to play at end."

But the major problems have been ironed out after 13 games at the new post. Now Williams is concentrating on the points.

"I made some mistakes against those giants of Southern Miss," Williams said of Arkansas' 13-0 victory. "We've worked those mistakes — containing outside game and improving rush — and now we're ready for A&M."

Petty, Allison Have Showdown Scheduled At Texas 500 Race

Bobby Allison continued to close the gap on Richard Petty's lead in the NASCAR Winston Cup Point Standings by winning the American 500 at Rockingham last Sunday.

Bobby Petty and Allison have engaged in a hotly contested battle all season which will come to a showdown in the third annual Texas 500 at the Texas World Speedway on Sunday, November 12th.

Petty will be seeking his third consecutive win at the mammoth Texas facility and his fourth Grand National championship. Another title for the Randleman, North Carolina native would make him the first driver in the history of NASCAR to accomplish such a feat.

Allison has already duplicated his winning season of last year by taking the checkered flag ten times in Grand National com-

petition and earning \$255,050.

USAC contenders, A. J. Foyt and Johnny Rutherford along with ARCA's Ron Hutcherson won't make anything easier for the NASCAR drivers entered in the Texas 500. The high-flying Foyt has already beaten them in two out of three outings this season and the versatile Rutherford is always capable of winning any race he enters. Hutcherson will return fresh from his victory in the Royal Triton ARCA 300.

The entry of Clint Hutchinson of Westminster, California raises the total number of entries to 72, with over a week remaining before the deadline.

The action-packed race week gets underway on Thursday, November 9th.

Start of the third annual Texas 500 is set for 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, November 12th.

Cowboys Struggle To 28-24 Victory

DALLAS (AP) — Super Bowl champion Dallas, struggling to stay alive in the race to the 1972 National Football League playoffs, rode the passing arm of much-maligned quarterback Craig Morton to a crucial 28-24 victory over the Detroit Lions on Monday night.

Morton, who took over from Super Bowl hero Roger Staubach after the darling of the Dallas' fans was injured during the exhibition season, threw three touchdown passes and set up the fourth TD with his tosses in the nationally-televised game.

With cheers instead of boos ringing in his helmet for a change, Morton wowed the sellout crowd of 65,000 in Texas Stadium with a 38-yard touchdown throw to Billy Parks and a 33-yard scoring shot to Calvin Hill on Dallas' first two possessions.

He also dropped off a short screen pass to Mike Montgomery for 27 yards to set up a one-yard plunge by Montgomery for a touchdown and collaborated with the second-string running back on a 15-yard scoring pass.

The victory kept the Cowboys within one game of Washington in the National Conference East with a 5-2 record while the loss dropped Detroit into a tie with Green Bay at 4-3 for the lead in the NFC Central.

Dallas built up a 21-14 half-time lead as the Lions scored on a two-yard run by quarterback Greg Landry, who also threw running back Altie Taylor a short pass which turned into a 40-yard touchdown play.

Both defenses stiffened in the second half as Detroit tallied on a 17-yard field goal by Errol Mann and Morton threw his third touchdown pass—the 15-yarder to Montgomery.

Landry narrowed the gap in the waning moments when he threw a 21-yard scoring pass to Larry Walton with 1:36 left.

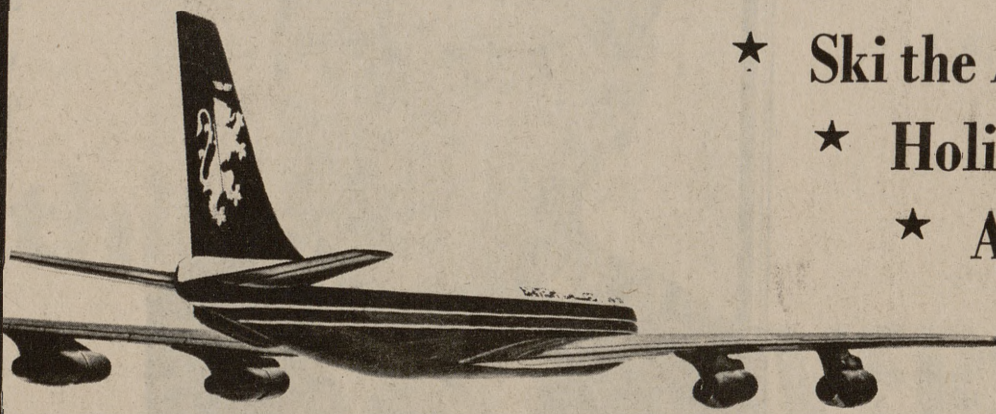
