

Arizona's Governor Williams Subject To Recall

Jack Williams of Arizona, a man whose politics are motivated by copper, real estate and agribusiness interests, is about to become the second governor in the history of the nation to be subject to the humiliation of a general recall election.

Only full-time (i.e. year-round) farmworkers can vote in union elections, quite neatly ruling out participation by migrant workers and short-term pickers.

Boycotts of produce are illegal: anyone advocating a boycott can be prosecuted on misdemeanor charges.

Farm workers may not strike during harvest season, which, of course, the only time a strike could be at all effective.

Hiring halls are illegal, which makes it considerably more difficult for transient farm workers to secure short-term jobs.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee said Thursday the government's "heavy spending cannot long continue without chaotic consequences."

he doesn't know whether it would. McClellan, who took over as chairman of the Appropriations Committee in the final months of the last session of Congress, said the courts ultimately will have to resolve the dispute over whether the President can impound funds voted by Congress.

Some Democratic leaders have accused President Nixon of exceeding his authority and encroaching on the powers of Congress by impounding or otherwise withholding appropriated funds.

Around \$12 billion is currently impounded, as Nixon has acted to hold spending in the current fiscal year to \$250 billion in an effort to fight inflation and avoid an increase in taxes.

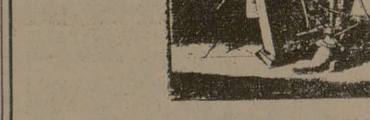
TAMU President Dr. Jack K. Williams presided over the service which was attended by more than 1,000 students, faculty, and citizens of the Bryan-College Station area.
