

Jury Finds Two More Watergate Defendants Guilty

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two former officials of President Nixon's re-election committee were convicted Tuesday of conspiracy, burglary and wiretapping of Democratic party headquarters in the Watergate political-espionage case.

The jury of eight women and four men took less than 90 minutes to convict G. Gordon Liddy and James W. McCord Jr.—respectively the general counsel and

security chief of the Committee for the Re-election of the President.

McCord was one of five men arrested in the Watergate office building quarters of the Democratic National Committee last June 17. Liddy was described by the prosecution as the boss of the operation, a contention accepted by the jury in convicting him of conspiracy.

The 16-day trial failed to an-

swer wider questions raised in the Watergate affair—whether the conspirators were acting on orders from higher up in the Nixon campaign organization, or whether they went off on their own in illegal activities.

A Senate panel is expected to look into such issues in a later inquiry.

E. Howard Hunt and four of the men arrested with McCord pleaded guilty at the trial start

and await sentencing—now along with Liddy and McCord.

Chief U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica, who presided over the trial, ordered Liddy's and McCord's bond revoked and the men were jailed. Hunt posted \$100,000 surety bond; the other four remain in custody.

Liddy and McCord took the verdict with slight smiles.

Neither defendant testified. There were 51 witnesses for the

prosecution and 11 for the defense.

Sentencing for all seven will come later after presentence investigations.

Liddy was convicted of conspiracy and two counts each of second-degree burglary, attempting to intercept oral and wire communications and actually intercepting conversations.

McCord was convicted on those same charges, plus two counts of

possessing bugging equipment.

The trial stemmed from the bugging and break-in of Democratic party headquarters in the Watergate building last June 17.

The attorneys for McCord and Liddy said they would request a bond hearing before Judge Sirica Wednesday.

Gerald Alch, attorney for McCord, said basic grounds for appeal would be Sirica's failure to allow questioning of prospective

jurors on an individual basis, his denial of mistrial motions after five of the defendants pleaded guilty and denial of Alch's request that he be allowed to present witnesses that McCord acted to prevent greater crimes.

Alch was asked whether there were higher Republican re-election officials involved and replied: "Mr. McCord was concerned solely with the charges against him and that was the limit of my knowledge."

The jury had received the case at 4:35 p.m. and sent out word that a verdict had been reached before 6.

It had been sequestered in the federal courthouse since Jan. 9.

In his instructions, Judge Sirica told them they were searching for the truth.

Quake Hits In Mexico

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A strong earthquake rocked the entire central plateau of Mexico Tuesday afternoon and initial reports indicated some injuries and property damage in numerous cities.

The quake occurred at 3:02 p.m. CST and the epicenter located about 500 kilometers west of here in Colima and Michoacan states registered 7-7.5 on the Richter Scale, the Tacubaya Observatory here reported.

The tremor's intensity in this city reached six points on the Mercalli scale, the observatory said, and lasted three minutes and 20 seconds.

Colima Police Inspector Col. Candido Rangel said at least 10 injured persons were received at local hospitals and at least four homes were destroyed.

The fire volcano of Colima located about 80 kilometers north of the city spewed a large cloud of smoke and ash when the quake occurred.

The volcano last erupted in 1913. The government palace there was cracked from the tremor, it was reported.

The tremor was reported in San Luis Potosi, Guadalajara, Aguascalientes and Celaya.
