

Hexachlorophene Linked By FDA To Deaths

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal records associate the deaths of 15 persons in this country with the external use of germ-killing solutions containing hexachlorophene.

The antibacterial cleansing agent in most cases was pHisoHex, manufactured by Winthrop Laboratories and containing 3 percent hexachlorophene (HCP), according to Food and Drug Administration records.

The manufacturer denied any link between the deaths and the use of pHisoHex.

HCP, once widely used in pop-

ular deodorant products sold over the counter, was banned from all but prescription products in September.

In announcing the ban, the FDA cited the deaths of 39 French infants and a university study correlating frequent bathings with HCP solutions and brain lesions in premature infants. But the agency did not tell newsmen of HCP's association with the 15 U.S. deaths even though it was aware of them.

Said why, an agency spokesman asked the French and university reports formed "the impor-

tant data."

"Our action was fully responsive on the basis of the data as it was being developed," he said.

The FDA records do not list HCP as cause of the 15 deaths, which occurred between 1954 and 1971. Instead, they are reported in a September, 1972 FDA summary under a category entitled: "Fatal Reactions Associated with Topical Use" of HCP.

The FDA summary also lists several nonfatal reactions and

other deaths associated with accidental swallowing of products containing HCP.

Many of the 15 deaths under the topical use category occurred during a period when Winthrop Laboratories was not reporting any adverse reactions to the product to the FDA.

An official of Sterling Drug, Inc., which owns Winthrop Laboratories, said in a telephone interview that the deaths noted in the FDA report "are not pHiso-

Hex deaths."

"Just because someone happens to be bathing with hexachlorophene at the time he dies doesn't mean he dies from hexachlorophene," said Dr. Monroe Trout, Sterling's medical director.

The FDA records on fatal reactions associated with HCP cite instances in hospitals of the use of pHisoHex on burns and in enemas and vaginal packs. The dead included both adults and children.

Taking its strongest action

against HCP last September, the FDA noted reports that the French infants died as a result of baby powder accidentally containing 6 per cent HCP, double the intended dose.

Earlier, in December 1971, the FDA sent a drug bulletin to 600,000 doctors and other health professionals, warning them to discontinue use of products such as pHisoHex in routine bathing of infants and adults.

The bulletin cited studies by Winthrop which showed that monkeys bathed in a 3 per cent HCP solution for 60 days had developed brain lesions.

U.S. Vetoes U.N. Resolution

PANAMA (AP) — Ambassador John Scali, using the third American veto in United Nations history Wednesday night, killed a Security Council resolution urging the United States to conclude "without delay" a new treaty governing the U.S.-run Canal Zone.

The vote was 13 to 1, with only the United States dissenting.

Scali, who became Washington's top U.N. delegate two months ago, said it was not "appropriate or helpful" for the United Nations to get involved in what he called a bilateral issue between Washington and Panama.

The resolution was sponsored by Panama, Guinea, Peru, Sudan, Yugoslavia, Kenya, India and Indochina. Panama demands control over the canal that was built through its territory by the United States early in this century.

Council President Aquilino Boyd, the Panamanian envoy to the United Nations, called for a vote with a show of hands.

The resolution on which the 15-nation council voted was a watered-down version of the original submitted by Panama. Britain abstained in the vote.

The United States previously has used its veto power in the council to block a proposal for severing all communications with the white minority government of Rhodesia in 1970 and a Mideast resolution in September 1972 directed against Israel.

The meeting in Panama, which began last Thursday, was the Security Council's first in Latin America. Brig. Gen. Omar Torrijos, the Panamanian leader, invited the council to meet here to attract world attention to Panama's dispute with Washington over the U.S.-run canal.

Scali, attending his first council meeting as Washington's U.N. ambassador, said Tuesday the United States was ready to conclude a new treaty promptly. But he added the United States believes it should "continue to be responsible for the operation and defense of the canal for an additional specified period of time."

The 550-square-mile canal zone, which links the Pacific and Atlantic oceans, has been in U.S. hands since 1903, the date of the existing treaty that gives the United States control "in perpetuity."

Panama has been trying to negotiate a new treaty for nine years.
