troops are out of Vietnam. The Khmer Rouge are nomiouk, who now lives in Peking. The insurgents have about 40,000 combat troops in the field. They are trained, supplied and led down to platoon level by North Vietnamese, of whom there are about 23,000 in the country.

Ranged against them are about 180,000 government troops. But the army and administration are plagued by corruption and there has been mounting discontent against Premier Lon Nol as a result of rising prices and general war weariness.
