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# **Bill Would Allow 16-Year-Old Girls To Get Contraceptives With Consent**

AUSTIN (AP) - Girls 16 and older could get contraceptive information and devices from doctors with parental consent under a bill approved Wednesday by a House subcommittee.

It would permit a woman between 16 and 21 to receive pregnancy care and contraceptive measures from a physician without the doctor having to get the consent of her parents, as present law requires.

Girls under 16 also could receive such care without parental permission if they were living away from home or their parents could not be located.

A doctor could tell a girl's parent he had treated her for pregnancy or precribed birth control

"We are symbolically saying that we recognize the solidity of the family but we also recognize there are some problems," said Rep. Lyndon Olson, D-Waco, who opposed Ms. Miller's amendment.

Rep. Ben T. Reyes, D-Houston, tried to strike a provision allowing a doctor or other person to refuse on religious grounds to provide contraceptive measures. "I don't think you should have

a religious reason. If we start getting into that we'll be starting to legislate morals," Reyes said. "It is a person's right to have that professional right at this time," said Von Dohlen, a Ro-

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Lloyd Bentsen voted with the majority and Republican Sen.

John Tower voted against it in the 70-24 roll call vote by which the Senate Wednesday approved the part of Sen. Sam J. Ervin's D-N.C., amendment that would curb presidential impoundment of funds appropriated by Congress. The Senate Wednesday defeated 69-23 a move by Tower to table and thus kill Ervin's amendment combining a \$268 billion spending ceiling for next year with a permanent curb on presi-
