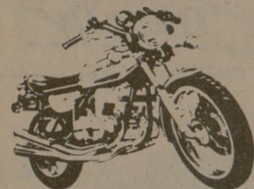


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**Two A&M Students To Visit USSR**

A&M has 10 students preparing for the 1973 Experiment in International Living, including an unprecedented two Experimenters to the Soviet Union.

A&M also will be represented in Germany, Switzerland, Denmark and Mexico.

The Memorial Student Center Travel Committee assisted stu-

dents in arranging Experiments.

The EIL enhances cultural understanding by locating students as members of families in other countries. EIL student groups also make travel tours, usually in the country they visit.

For seven of the last eight years, TAMU has been the only U.S. university with one student leader in the EIL to Soviet Russia. They have spent the summer with Russian students.

The Experiment, headquartered in Putney, Vt., waived its rules of only one student per campus per EIL group to allow A&M to send two students to Russia this summer. They are Cathleen Schnatterly, senior math major from Odessa, and Louis Gohmert, history major from Mt. Pleasant and sophomore class president. Schnatterly is a student senator from the College of Science. Gohmert is also an officer in the Opera and Performing Arts Society.
