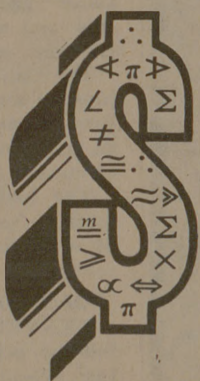
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Police Kill Provoking Gunman

PEORIA, Ill. (AP)—A man shouting "Kill me! Kill me! Kill me!" and holding a gun in one hand and a student hostage in the other, was shot dead by police Tuesday when he emerged from a Roman Catholic elementary school.

The gunman and two other men sought refuge in the school after fleeing police, authorities said, and held 44 children and

four adults hostage for almost two hours in the school's basement cafeteria.

The other two gunmen later surrendered after talking with a Peoria police officer, the brother of the slain gunman and a community action agency employee.

The dead man was identified as Melvin Burch, 25, of Peoria. The student he held hostage,

John Ardis, son of a Peoria alderman, escaped unharmed, authorities said.

Capt. Sal Pisano of the Peoria police said the men rushed into the grounds of St. Cecilia's School at 2:30 p.m. following a robbery of a Peoria variety store.

Sister Anne Delores, a teacher, said the men first entered a classroom in a small building near the school, where she was working with a class of 24 students.

She said the men marched the entire class and about 20 other students they picked up on the playground into the cafeteria in the basement of the main building.

Meanwhile the building was surrounded by between 40 and 50 city county and state police and FBI agents, said Pisano. These were ultimately joined by an estimated 5,000 spectators, he said.

Sister Anne Dolores said that one of the gunmen was shooting at police through the windows, then turned to John Ardis, a 6th grader and son of Alderman James Ardis, and said "you come with me."

The man stepped outside, fired two shots in the air and shouted "Kill me! Kill me! Kill me!" and was shot down by police, a photographer for the Peoria Journal Star said.

House Reps File Complaints

AUSTIN (AP)—Three state representatives said Tuesday they will file complaints against the state comptroller's office for alleged discrimination against minority groups and women.

They said the charges would be filed at the San Antonio office of the Equal Employment Opportunities Commission, a federal enforcement agency with equal hiring laws.

State Comptroller Robert Calvert was recovering from illness and also could not comment, an aide said. He added that Calvert had not seen copies of the complaints.

Committee OKs Pot Law Reforms

AUSTIN (AP)—The Senate Jurisprudence Committee voted 8-4 Tuesday for legislation that would make first offense possession of up to 4 ounces of marijuana punishable by a maximum sentence of 7 days in jail and a \$200 fine.

By an identical 8-4 vote, the committee approved a comprehensive bill overhauling all Texas drug laws, including the same provisions on marijuana as the first bill.

Both measures now go to the Senate floor for debate. The House will debate its version of the drug bill Thursday.

Sen. Tati Santiesteban, D-El Paso, chairman of the subcommittee that wrote the bills, said he would not offer the one that deals only with marijuana unless it became obvious that the comprehensive bill cannot pass.

"What I'm very fearful of is that this Senate will not pass any drug legislation," Santiesteban said.

He said he wants to be sure there is a chance to reduce Texas' penalty for marijuana possession—two years to life, the stiffest in the United States—before the next legislature meets in 1975.

The comprehensive bill is the one advocated by Gov. Dolph Briscoe, but it was amended 24 times in subcommittee.

Like the single shot marijuana bill, it provides that possession of four to eight ounces will be punished by a jail term up to six months and-or a fine up to \$1,000.

More than eight ounces would carry a prison term of 2-10 years and-or a fine up to \$5,000. This same penalty would apply to the sale of marijuana. Giving a quarter of an ounce or less to another person would be punishable in the same way as possession of up to four ounces.

Both bills provide that the estimated 400 to 500 men in the state penitentiary on marijuana charges, and the estimated 40,000 Texans who have been convicted in marijuana cases, could petition the judge who sentenced them for resentencing under the new law. This would reduce most of those felony cases to misdemeanors.

Ziegler Says He's Sorry To Post, Press

WASHINGTON (AP)—White House Press Secretary Ronald Ziegler publicly apologized to the Washington Post Tuesday for past harsh criticism of its investigative reporting of the Watergate conspiracy.

Asked if he would apologize in the wake of President Nixon's tv-radio statement Monday night that a "vigorous free press" helped uncover the truth about Watergate, Ziegler replied:

"Yes, I would apologize to the Post."

He then volunteered an apology to Post reporters Carl Bernstein and Bob Woodward who, he said, vigorously pursued the story, deserved credit for their work and are receiving it.

"When we're wrong, we're wrong," the White House spokesman said.

Last Oct. 25, Ziegler characterized the Post account as "a blatant effort at character assassination that I do not think has been witnessed in the political process in some time."

In his remarks today, Ziegler said, "I think we'd all have to say mistakes were made... I was overenthusiastic at that time in my comments about the Post... It was an overstatement."

"I will dignify with comment Mr. Ziegler's apology; it's entirely welcome," said Harry Rosenfeld, metropolitan editor of the Post and the man in charge of the work done by Bernstein and Woodward.

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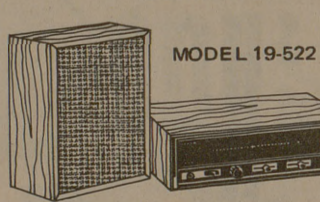
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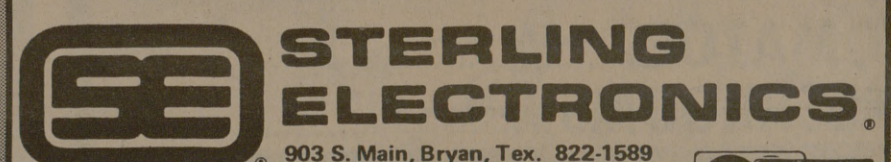
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
