

Top Drivers, Cars Entered In Alamo 500 Race

Entries from each of the nation's Big Four automobile manufacturers will make up one of the most competitive fields ever assembled at Texas World Speedway for the June 10th Alamo 500.

Probable entries include Richard Petty and Buddy Baker, who will carry the banner for Chrysler in a pair of Dodges. Petty will be going after his third win at the Texas oval. The Randle-

man, N. C. charger took the checkered flag in the 1971 Texas 500 and again in last June's 500-mile. Baker hopes to match Petty's win record with a second consecutive victory at Texas World Speedway after edging out A. J. Foyt for a win in the Texas 500 last November.

General Motors is expected to be represented by a strong foursome of Chevrolets and a lone Pontiac entry. The entries of

Bobby and Donnie Allison along with Cale Yarborough and Benny Parsons should give Chevrolet its best chance ever for a win at the 2-mile, high-banked facility. The Pontiac challenge will come from Houston's H. B. Bailey. Bailey's new Grand Am could give Pontiac its first NASCAR Grand National win since '63.

Two strong contenders from the Ford Motor Company camp

that could produce a winner are Bobby Isaac in the "small block" Ford and David Pearson in the Wood Brothers Mercury. Isaac's continued good performance on super speedways with the little Ford places him among the favorites. The Catawba, N. C. chauffeur won the inaugural Texas 500 at TWS in 1969. Pearson, winner of five consecutive races this season, will definitely be a

top choice for a win in the Alamo 500.

American Motors' bid will rely on Dave Marcis at the wheel of the Roger Penske prepared Matador. The Matador picked up a win in the season opener at Riverside with Indianapolis 500 champion Mark Donohue at the wheel. Since Donohue's return to the USAC and SCCA circles, NASCAR veteran Marcis has taken over the driving duties of

the Matador and is long overdue for a win.

Qualifying for the \$92,000 Alamo 500 begins on Friday, June 8th.

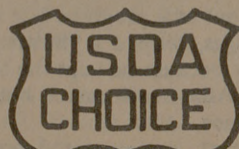

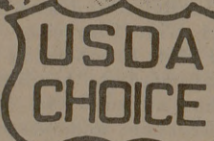
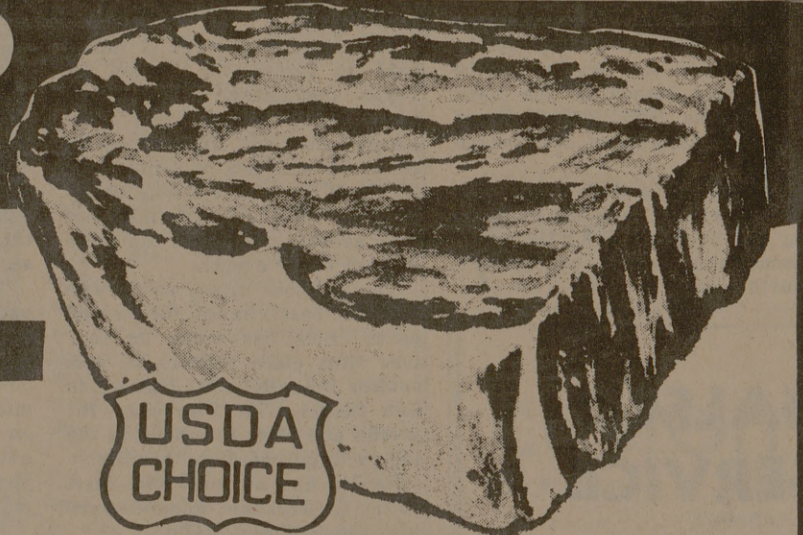
