

Houston's Tarpon Swim Club Dominates A&M Invitational

Tarpon Swim Club of Houston dominated the weekend Texas A&M University Long-Course Invitational, but Bob Leland of the College Station Swim Club ranked among the top individuals with two wins which qualify him for senior circuit meets throughout the Southwest.

Leland won the 100-meter free style in 59.2 seconds Sunday after having topped the field Saturday in the 200-meter individual medley with a 2:28.

Tarpon piled up 978 points during the two-day meet at TAMU's Wofford Cain Olympic Pool. Houston Swim Club was a distant sec-

ond with 298 points, followed by Swim-A-Day of Austin with 268.

CSSC finished seventh after having been in 11th place at the end of the first day.

Other CSSC swimmers ranking among the leaders in their events were:

Boys — Greg Vanderzant, second, senior 100-meter free style; Tom Comstock, third, senior 100-meter butterfly; Ed Kahil, third, 13-14 age group, 100-meter butterfly; and Scott Lambert, third, 9-10 age group 50-meter breast.

The 13-14 year old boys' 400-meter medley relay team, consisting of David Comstock, Chris Stephenson, Ross Todaro and Kahil, won third-place honors, as did the 13-14 boys' free style relay team, made up of Mark Roebeck, Comstock, Kahil and Todaro.

Girls—Adriana Giarola was second in the senior 100-meter breast and third in the 200 free style.

The girls' 10 and under 200-meter free style relay team had a third-place finish. The team was composed of Janet Saylor and three sisters, Margaret, Karyn and Kate Hurley.

CSSC's next meet will be the Lone Star Invitation in San Antonio June 9-10.

Becomes Fourth Ex-Winner Isaac Joins TWS Alamo Field

Bobby Isaac, winner of the inaugural Texas 500, becomes the fourth former winner at Texas World Speedway to join the list of entries for the June 10th Alamo 500.

Isaac's victory at Texas World Speedway in 1969 was his first win on a super speedway. The Catawba, N.C., driver practically dominated the short track circuit during the '69 season before coming to Texas, but always experienced some type of difficulty that prevented him from winning

one of the big ones. It seemed that Bobby was not destined to win at a super speedway. He had almost convinced himself that his day was never going to come. Suddenly, his luck changed and he ended the best season of his career with his first major victory.

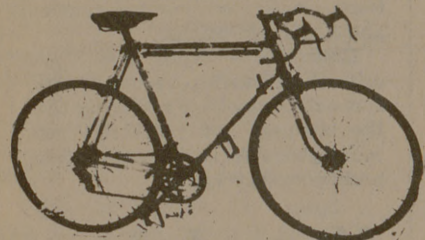
In 1971 Isaac returned to the high speed Texas oval hoping to add another chapter to his classic success story of 1969 with a second consecutive win. He had already won over \$100,000 for the

second time in as many years, and had also captured the Firecracker 400 at Daytona International Speedway earlier that season. However, a second win at Texas World Speedway was not part of the future for Bobby Isaac. His hopes diminished before completing even the first lap. His engine failed going into the third turn and the defending Texas 500 Champion finished a disappointing last without complet-

ing a single lap. Isaac, like all successful drivers, has learned to forget the heart-breaking experience. He will return to Texas World Speedway for the Alamo 500 with the attitude that he will win. Driving the 351 cubic inch Torino prepared by veteran mechanic Bud Moore, Isaac has already scored two second place finishes this season and will be a good choice to win at the Alamo

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Hylton Has Most Laps

James Hylton has completed more laps during competition at the Texas World Speedway than any other driver. Hylton, who has entered all four NASCAR Grand National events at the World's Fastest Speedway has completed a total of 1,906 miles out of a possible 2,000 during competition at the track. Richard Petty is second with 1,884 miles completed and Bobby Allison is third, having run 1,818 miles.

Petty Led On 397 Laps

Richard Petty has led more laps during NASCAR events at the Texas World Speedway than any other driver. Petty has dominated the lead position during Grand National races at Texas World Speedway on 25 different occasions for a total of 397 laps. Buddy Baker has led on 23 occasions for 332 laps and Bobby Allison has commanded the lead position 10 times for 85 laps.

Twelve Students Enrolled In Telephone Training Course

Twelve students have enrolled in the Cable Fault Location School being conducted at the A&M Research Annex by the Electrical and Telephone Training Center.

The course is being conducted by J. O. Lewis, instructor at the center, and personnel from the Engineering Extension Service, a division of TAMU.

The one-week course will include use of voltohmmilliammeters to detect cable faults.

Uses of the Wheatstone Bridge to detect and locate faults of loop resistance measurements and Three Varley methods, underground cable locators, aerial cable locators and open locators will also be covered during the course.

Students instructed in the methodology and application of test equipment will be required to use the instruments to locate faults placed in both underground and aerial cable at the training center.
