Freddie Fleming Killed In Car Wreck

SOMERVILLE — One of Texas A&M University's brightest and newest track hopefuls was found dead Friday evening in a smashed car found in a drainage ditch approximately 1 1/2 miles north of Brenham.

The body of Fred Fleming, 18, and Veronica Maldonado, 16, both of Somerville, were discovered in a car in which the couple reportedly drove to Brenham Tuesday night to see a movie, according to A. G. Wilhelm, Burtleson County sheriff.

Wilhelm said the parents of the couple had asked him to

search for them after they did not return home Tuesday night, the night the accident presumably occurred.

The sheriff said the car apparently went off the side of an overpass near the Brenham bypass and fell into a deep drainage ditch, smashing in the car top.

Depth of the drainage ditch kept the wreck from view for two days.

A man who lived near the drainage ditch went out to mow his lawn Friday and discovered the wrecked car.

The accident was investigated by representatives of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the sheriff's office in Brenham. Wilhelm was called to the scene after it was discovered the car was the one he had been searching for since Wednesday.

The bodies of Fleming and Ms. Maldonado were buried in Somerville cemeteries Saturday.

Fleming was set to come to

A&M this fall on a track scholarship. His track talents sparked in the state track meet in early May.

He was the high point athlete among all entries, winning 100 yard dash, the 220-yard dash and the long jump in which he set a new state record.

Fleming was a multi-talented athlete, finishing the last football season for the Somerville Yequas as the top passcatcher on the team. His football coach rated him one of the best high school receivers in the state.

Ms. Maldonado attended school in Somerville and played on the girls basketball team.

Also active in tennis and softball, Ms. Maldonado was a member of the Somerville High School Pep squad. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Maldonado of Somerville.

Fleming was the son of Fred Fleming Sr. of Somerville.

Brubacher Quits Chicago

RENSSELAER, Ind. (AP)—Three veteran players with the Chicago Bears of the National Football League, including one member of the team's 1963 championship squad, announced their retirements Sunday.

They were Jim Cadile, 33, offensive guard; Steve DeLong, 30, defensive end, and Ross Brubacher, 25, right linebacker.

Cadile had been a starter with the Bears since he came to the club in 1962, but a series of injuries sidelined him for most of last season. He played on the 1963 championship team.

DeLong, a graduate of the University of Tennessee, played his eighth season of professional football last year. The Bears obtained him last season from the San Diego Chargers for a draft choice and he immediately became a regular at defensive end.

Brubacher, who came to the Bears in 1970 after graduating from Texas A&M, had been a starter at right linebacker. He told the Bears he has enrolled in law school.

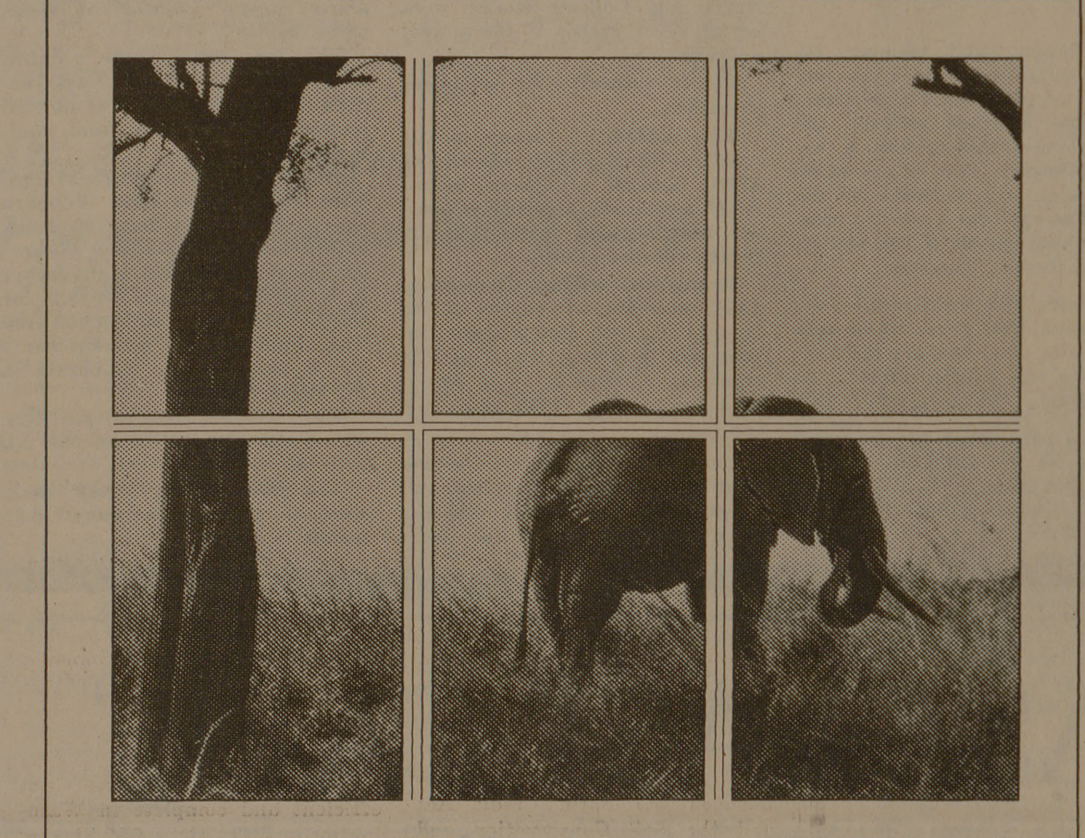

per hour. In the field, it chugs along at a half to 4 mph, depending upon purpose and conditions. Up to 75 acres a day can be treated.

Microwave power source is a diesel generator. Electrical energy is then converted to microwave energy. Penetration ranges from the surface to 24 inches deep in the soil, and is adjustable according to conditions and need. A variety of safety devices protect the operator.

Another Zapper demonstration was conducted Saturday. The session attracted such dignitaries as A&M President Jack K. Williams; Dr. Theodore Davis, rural loans supervisor, The World Bank; Dr. Robert Menges of Weslaco, U. S. Department of Agriculture; and George Sealy, vice president, Bechtel Corporation, San Francisco, Calif.

During the Saturday activities, Hughey presented Williams with the first royalty check from earnings of Zapper prototypes.
