

# Ten Faculty Members Added to College of Vet Medicine

A&M's College of Veterinary Medicine has added ten new faculty members to its staff for the coming year.

Heading the list of new appointments is Dr. Alvin A. Price, former dean of the college, who left the position to return to full-time teaching. He will be a professor of veterinary physiology and pharmacology.

Returning to the faculty roster are Drs. M. R. Herron, M. A. Her-

ron, and H. W. Whitford. Dr. M. R. (Mike) Herron returns as associate professor of veterinary medicine and surgery after a year at Purdue University for graduate work. His wife, Dr. Mary A. Herron, will be assistant professor of veterinary anatomy. She also received her DVM degree at Purdue.

Dr. Whitford will be an instructor in veterinary microbiology after having served as a gradu-

ate assistant in that same department for a year. He is completing work on his Ph.D. degree.

Dr. Charles B. Quick has been appointed research associate in the Department of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery. He received the DVM degree from A&M Aug. 3.

Dr. Charles M. Savell has been named Resident in the Small Animal Clinic at the college. He is a 1973 graduate of the Oklahoma

State University College of Veterinary Medicine.

Dr. James M. (Mike) Heitmann will be an instructor in the Department of Veterinary Medicine. He captained the 1969-70 Aggie basketball team which finished second in Southwest Conference play.

Dr. John McGrath has been named assistant professor of veterinary pathology. McGrath was graduated from University Col-

lege, Dublin, and recently received his Ph.D. from the University of Georgia. He was a lecturer in the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Biochemistry at the Irish school before coming to this country. He is a member of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons in London.

Two new faculty members in the Department of Veterinary Physiology and Pharmacology include Drs. Lelve G. Gayle, re-

search associate, and Sandee M. Hartsfield, assistant professor.

Dr. Gayle was a distinguished student with listing in Who's Who in American Universities during his undergraduate stay at A&M. He was an officer in the Air Force and practiced privately in Richardson before returning to A&M. He will research diagnosis and treatment of thyroid disease, the relationship of proton radiation to space travel and neutron

radiation in cancer therapy.

Dr. Hartsfield is a native of Bryan. He graduated with the DVM degree from A&M with honors in 1971. He completed a two-year residency program at Michigan State University where he received the M.S. degree in July.

The former distinguished student is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Hartsfield of Bryan.

A special schedule will be worked out with university police to keep a close check on women's dormitories, officials said.

They claim efforts during the summer to hold down on the use of energy resulted in decreases of approximately 30 per cent.
