"I think I speak for the mothers of this state that we do not need any text books that state the case for homosexuals. Our society has sunk to a new low if we accept them," she said, her voice trembling.

Mrs. Gabler, who with her husband has been reviewing and criticizing proposed textbooks for 13 years, directed much of her protest against a book "Behind the Mask: Our Psychological World," published by Prentice-Wall, Inc.

She quoted a passage from the book that said, in part, "in some states a person convicted of certain homosexual acts, such as sodomy, may receive a prison sentence of 60 years to life. It makes one wonder who is the most bizarre, the people who support this legislation or the homosexuals. One almost gets the impression that sex of any type, even between husand and wife, is illegal."

"That is a real plug for homosexuals," Mrs. Gabler said.


