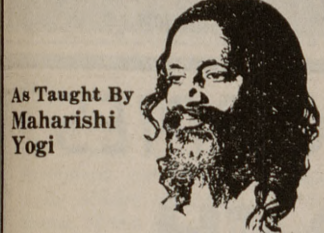


# Open Field Goal Kicking Contest Set Intramural Volleyball Kings Decided

Lots of flat-handed returns and carrying penalties plagued BSU. Their serving was decent but it was an average game.

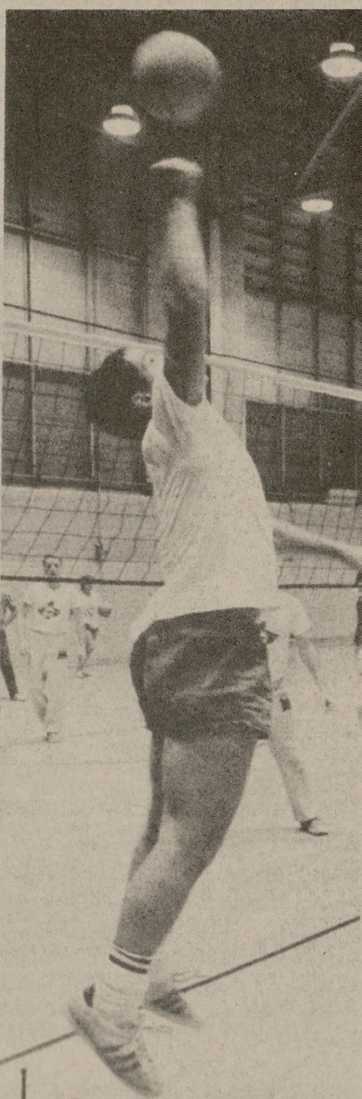
Tonight, the dorm champions will play STAT in G. Rollie's third floor annex for civilian crown with E2 meeting that game's victor in the All-University playoff.

## Cotton Bowl Opens Ticket Sales Thursday

Ticket applications for the 1974 Cotton Bowl Classic will be accepted by mail only for a 13-day period beginning Thursday.

The annual New Year's Day game, played in Dallas' Cotton Bowl, matches the Southwest Conference champion against a ranking major-college team.

The public sale will run from Thursday (Oct. 25) through Tuesday, Nov. 6. Ticket requests should be mailed to the Cotton Bowl Athletic Association, Box 7185, Dallas, Texas 75209. Each order should include \$8 per ticket, plus a 50-cent mailing fee per order. No more than ten tickets should be requested with each order—those wishing to order more than ten tickets should mail extra requests.

After the public sale closes the only available tickets will be through the participating schools, which employ ticket priority lists.

NCAA rules allow the guest team to be invited on Nov. 17 or the Saturday prior to its final game, whichever comes first.

Cotton Bowl Athletic Association president Field Scovell said eight teams are currently being considered as prime candidates to oppose the SWC champ. They are Alabama, Houston, LSU, Missouri, Nebraska, Notre Dame, Penn State and Tennessee.

Texas has been the host team a record five straight years, last New Year's Day defeating Alabama, 17-13, on a controversial 34-yard run by Alan Lowry with just over three minutes to play. The victory gave Texas No. 3 ranking for the 1972 season.

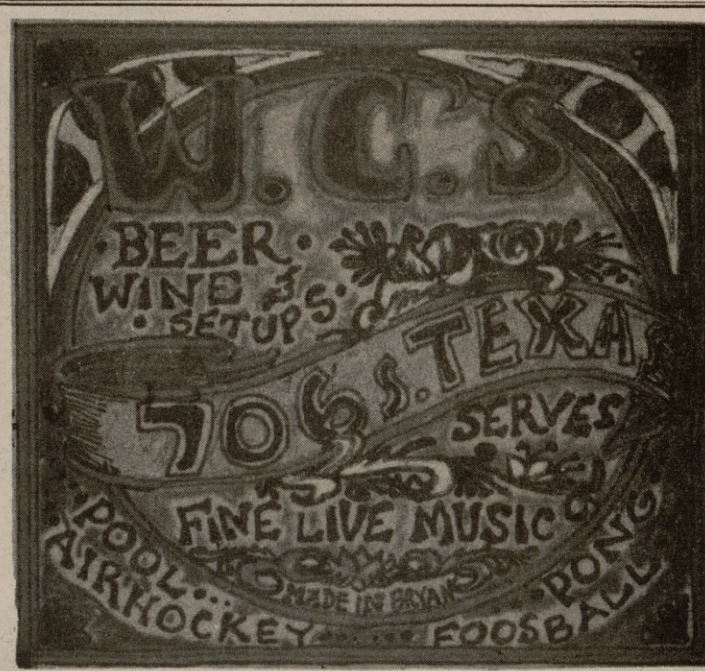
