

Bellard Praises David Walker's Game

Reserve QB David Shipman to Undergo Knee Operation

Head coach Emory Bellard graded freshman quarterback David Walker tops in his weekly press conference Tuesday.

"I thought David did a real good job," (in the 35-16 victory over TCU) said Bellard. "He was very precise and very positive in everything that he did."

Bellard said that David Shipman, reserve quarterback, is scheduled to undergo knee operation today. Shipman injured his knee two weeks before the season started and has not taken a snap as quarterback in any game or

practice. He has been holding for Randy Haddox's field goal and PAT attempts.

Shipman was the most sought after quarterback in the state last year leading Odessa Permian to the state 4AAAA championship. He had been expected to play this season but his knee has never responded to treatment.

Senior quarterback Tim Trimmer will take over his holding duties, said Bellard.

In looking at Baylor, this week's opponent, Bellard said, "They have a fine offensive team. The quarterback (Kent Marshall) is strong and experienced and is the top passer in the league. They have fine running backs with good speed, especially Gary

Lacy. They have an excellent receiver in Charlie Dancer and their offensive line of last year has returned intact. They have a lot of balance and a lot of skilled people.

"Their defense is the aggressive go-get-you type. With the exception of one quarter they battled Oklahoma almost to a standstill. They've been playing outstanding defense for two or three years. No doubt about it, they've got a good football team."

The offensive line received praise from Bellard for its performance against the Horned Frogs last week.

"All the linemen graded well," said Bellard. "Billy Lemons did a good job for blocking Charlie

Davis with help from Dennis Smelser."

FORT WORTH — Freshman Billy Neel was promoted to the Texas Christian University varsity squad Tuesday as head coach Billy Tohill sought relief for his growing injury problem.

Neel, 195 pound strong side linebacker from El Campo, moved into a backup spot since first teamer Mike Hanna of Anaheim, Calif., suffered strained knee ligaments against Texas A&M last week. Hanna is listed as doubtful for TCU's journey to Tennessee Saturday.

Sophomore Craig Lund of

Eastland may start in place of Hanna with Neel as the backup.

That brings TCU's total of freshmen varsity players to six, including tailback Chuck Boyd, offensive linemen Scott O'Glee, and Jerry Caillier, defensive tackle Jack Armstead and defensive back Roy Leach.

Texas Tech

LUBBOCK — Texas Tech resumed practice Tuesday after a two-day layoff and the results left Coach Jim Carlen anything but pleased.

"We didn't have a good practice," said Carlen. "We weren't sharp and we just stood around."

The Red Raiders, who knocked off their second nationally ranked team in three weeks with a 31-17 victory over Arizona last Saturday, took Sunday and Monday off in an effort to regain their vigor.

However, Tuesday's drills were sluggish and punctuated by missed assignments and dropped balls by the receivers.

A crowd of more than 45,000 is expected for Saturday's homecoming showdown with Southern Methodist. The two teams have but one loss apiece this season.

Ohio State Still on Top

Woody Hayes, the veteran coach of top-ranked Ohio State, has broken the unwritten code of college football.

He's publicly looking beyond the next game. In fact, he's outlined how he hopes to keep his Buckeyes unbeaten and No. 1 in The Associated Press college football poll for the next four weeks: Don't play conservative ball, at least not until Nov. 24 when OSU faces fourth-ranked Michigan.

"If we do, we're going downhill," said the crusty coach after his team crushed Indiana 37-7 in a Big Ten battle last Saturday. "If you button up, you get worse. We're playing some good football teams yet."

The Buckeyes, who received 35

first-place votes and 1,126 points in the weekly voting by sports writers and broadcasters Tuesday, have to get past Northwestern, Illinois, Michigan State and Iowa before they meet Michigan, one of 12 unbeaten, untied teams in the Top Twenty.

Alabama, a 42-21 victor over previously unbeaten Tennessee, remained No. 2 in the poll but narrowed the gap from 183 points of the previous week to 84 with 12 first-place votes and 1,042 points.

Oklahoma, which overwhelmed Colorado 34-7, collected eight top votes and 953 points, Michigan, a 35-6 victor over Wisconsin, remained fourth with one first-place vote and 857 points and Penn State, which bested Syracuse 49-6, was favored by four voters and received 709 points to remain fifth.

The only change in the Top Ten was the re-entry of Nebraska and the exit of Tennessee. The Cornhuskers, No. 2 two weeks ago and 11th last week after a 13-12 loss to Missouri, moved up to 10th with a 10-9 victory over Kansas. The Vols dropped to 14th from 10th.

Missouri, the only other team in the Top 10 to rate a No. 1 vote, remained seventh behind Southern California. Notre Dame, which faces Southern Cal in a showdown this weekend, was eight and Louisiana State ninth.

The bottom 10 includes Arizona State, Houston, UCLA, Tennessee, Tulane, Miami of Ohio, Kansas, Texas Tech, Texas and Richmond.

Senior or graduate students currently enrolled in an American university are eligible to participate in the Euromed program.

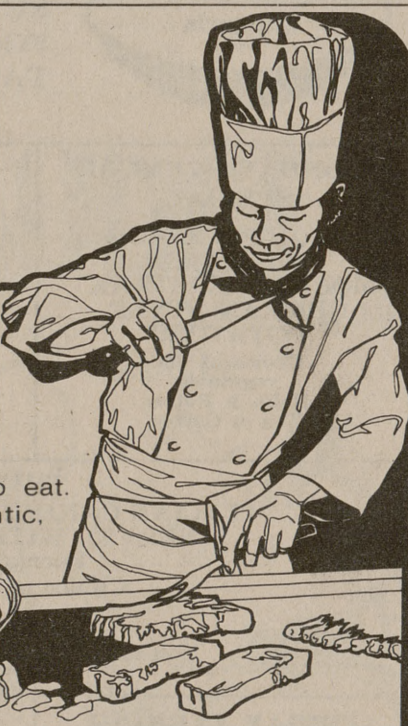

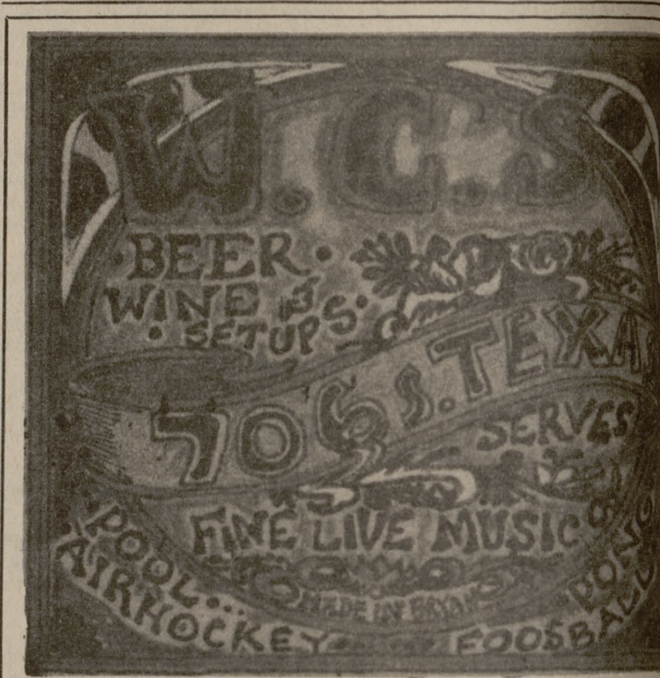
