WASHINGTON - The Senate passed and sent to the White House by an 80-5 vote a bill authorizing private construction of an oil pipeline across Alaska. Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., predicted President Nixon would sign the measure. He told the Senate that if environmental-

ists tie up the \$4.5 billion project with lawsuits he will introduce a bill to have the federal government build the pipeline.

WASHINGTON - The Department of Health, Education and Welfare rejected nine state plans for court-ordered racial desegretion of their public colleges and universities. The proposals submitted last summer "fall short of being acceptable" to meet a fed eral court deadline next April 8, said Peter E. Holmes, director of HEW's Office for Civil Rights. Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania and Virginia were told to submit improved plans. Louisiana and Mississippi were given the 90 days plus an interim Nov 30, 1974 deadline.
