
Leaks, who served as a Sunday school teacher in Brenham, enjoys working with young people and hopes some day to coach on a high school level.

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Unbeaten Ohio State, which prepped for Saturday's showdown against Big Ten co-leader Michigan with a 55-13 rout of winless Iowa last week, retained the top spot in The Associated Press college football ratings, announced Tuesday.

There was no change among the positions of the top 13 teams from last week's poll.

The Buckeyes received 34 firstplace votes and 1,142 points from the nationwide panel of 62 sports writers and broadcasters participating in this week's poll.

Second-ranked Alabama, which meets Louisiana State Thanksgiving Day in a Southeastern Conference showdown, got 16 firstplace mentions and 1,082 points. Oklahoma, which can clinch

the Big Eight title by beating Nebraska Friday, received nine firstplace votes and 973 points to retain third place.

The next three teams each received one first-place vote. Michigan held down fourth place with 845 points, Notre Dame was fifth at 760 and Penn State was sixth at 672.


