In addition to returning 100 per cent of the scorers, the Aggies also return 100 per cent of their rushers and virtually all of the total offense. In the latter category, 3,290 yards were accounted for by sophomores, 732 by freshmen, 25 by juniors and 19 by seniors.

Texas A&M of 1973 was perhaps the youngest major college football club in the country and it wasn't expected to be a big winner. It finished with a 5-6 record and had a chance to win every game except the season's finale

The Aggies led the SWC in total defense, was first in pass defense and second in rushing defense. It finished fourth in total offense, third in rushing offense and fourth in passing offense.






