

Defense readies for Henley testimony

HOUSTON (AP) — A pretrial hearing for a defendant in the Houston mass murder case recessed Wednesday without any public testimony.

State District Court Judge William Hatten conferred with lawyers for the state and for the defendant Elmer Wayne Henley, 17, in his chambers for two hours

Wednesday. He then announced the recess.

"We are calling this recess so the defendant may talk to his lawyers about the testimony he will give tomorrow," Hatten said.

Later, in an interview, Hatten said Henley's testimony would be restricted solely to oral and written confessions taken from him by officers unless "because of the

totality of the evidence, as the defense attorney is always saying, it becomes necessary to enter other areas."

Will Gray, one of Henley's lawyers, said he would hope that the judge would allow testimony only about the defendant's statements.

Henley is charged in six of the 27 deaths of teen-agers killed here

over a three year period by what police say was a homosexual murder-torture ring. They said Dean Arnold Corll, 33, was the leader of the ring and Henley and David Owen Brooks, 18, served as procurers. Brooks is charged in four cases and is due for trial later.

Henley shot Corll in what police called self defense last Aug. 8 and it was statements made by him to officers which uncovered the ring's activities. He led authorities to the bodies of 17 youths buried in a Houston boat stall, four near San Augustine, Tex., and six at High Island, Tex.

Gray said he hopes testimony will end Thursday on his motion to suppress those statements. He will go immediately into arguments on another motion to delay the trial of Henley for six months because of publicity growing out of the present hearing. Henley is scheduled for trial immediately

after the hearing in one of the slayings.

The lawyer said he plans to subpoena a number of reporters to testify in the continuance hearing. He had earlier indicated he wanted to learn how reporters obtained copies of a statement by Brooks implicating his client which was leaked by police.

Judge Hatten, who said he probably would not rule on the suppression of confessions motion until Monday, indicated he may go ahead and order Henley's trial moved to another location.

Hatten said he thinks the evidence he would hear on the postponement request would be similar to any presented on a motion to transfer the trial.

Gray has resisted efforts for a venue but Hatten said that if evidence shows Henley might not receive a fair trial here, he may order the case moved.

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Krogh testimony may finger Nixon

NEW YORK (AP) — Resigned treasury official Edward L. Morgan was quoted Wednesday as saying his friend Egil Krogh, who headed the White House "plumbers," will "spill his guts" and thereby probably help "do the President in."

But in another published report, columnist Jack Anderson said Krogh, who is now telling his story to the Watergate prosecutors, will accept responsibility for activities of the plumbers, such as the Ellsberg psychiatrist burglary, and not put the blame on the President.

Morgan, the former White House aide who signed the deed for Nixon's gift of his vice presi-

dential papers to the National Archives for a \$576,000 tax deduction, quit last week as assistant secretary of the treasury.

In an interview in the Wall Street Journal, Morgan is quoted as saying he does not think Nixon can escape impeachment and that Krogh's "confession" will be a major factor, along with the disclosure that portions of a crucial White House tape were erased.

"The tanks are coming. They're coming right down Pennsylvania Avenue and into the Oval Office," Morgan said in the interview, adding:

"If you think 1973 was bad, wait until Christmas 1974 rolls around. You'll think last year was a holiday."

In his syndicated column published Wednesday, Anderson said Watergate prosecutors had expected Krogh to tie the President directly to the plumbers' activities.

Anderson said the expectation was based in part on testimony of former White House counsel John W. Dean III, who quoted Krogh as saying the orders for the break-in at the office of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist came "right out of the Oval Office."

However, Anderson said, sources with access to Krogh's sworn statement said Krogh claimed Dean misunderstood him, and that it was the order setting up the plumbers units, not the order for the burglary, that came out of the President's Oval Office.

Oil pipeline permit signed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of the Interior Rogers C. B. Morton Wednesday signed the long-awaited permit for a 789-mile, \$5-billion pipeline to tap the rich oil fields of Alaska's North Slope.

"With a little cooperation from the weather man, I am optimistic that the oil of the North Slope will reach markets in the lower 48 states by 1977," Morton said.

Liddy knocked from bar post

NEW YORK (AP) — One of the four lawyers, G. Gordon Liddy, convicted of a Watergate-related crime has been disbarred, and actions pending before bar associations could lead to disbarment of the other three.

Now serving a prison term of up to 20 years, he was disbarred by the Appellate Division of New York's State Supreme Court June 17. The judges rejected a resignation that Liddy had submitted, saying disbarment was automatic immediately upon his conviction.

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Mexican authorities lift ban on porno

MEXICO CITY (AP) — More than 2,000 spectators gate crashed a government-owned movie theater here to see the first so-called pornographic movie allowed in this country—"Clockwork Orange."

Government authorities decided to let the gate crashers stay to avoid incidents after the 590-seat theater filled up and tickets ran out.

Officials of the usually conservative movie censorship board announced the controversial movie "Last Tango in Paris" also

will be shown in Mexico soon.

"Our policy will be that we will screen the movies until people get tired of them and don't see them anymore," a board official said.

These movies had been banned in Mexico and for the first time are being shown causing unprecedented ticket sales.
