The Ags didn't get a piece of the lead until just 2:24 remained with Rice leading by as many as nine midway through the final period.



Carroll led the Rice scoring with 20 points. Scott Fisher added 18, Charles Daniels 14, John Kabbes 12 and Tim Moriarty 11 as nine players hit double figures.

Tonight the Ags are back on the road, visiting Texas in Austin.

The Longhorns are the surprise team of the conference. After posting a 1-11 in pre-conference action, Texas rolled to three straight SWC victories before falling to loop leader Texas Tech Saturday.


While the Ags have not lost a home game this season, the road has been less than kind. A&M is 3-6 away from home, 0-2 in conference play.


