Poisoned candies for sale

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Food and Drug Administration said Tuesday that Canadian chocolate blamed for at least 47 cases of food poisoning in the United States is being recalled from the market.

The FDA said that thousands of chocolate balls, wrapped in multicolored metal foil have been associated with a salmonella illness which had been rare in this country.

The chocolate balls, labeled Regent Solid Milk Chocolate, were manufactured by Regent Chocolate Ltd. of St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, Canada, and distributed throughout the United States by Triumph Candy Corp. of Englewood Cliffs, N.J.

Consumers were advised to return the candy to the store where purchased.
