Ags faring well in Fayetteville

Swimmers holding third after one day in SWC meet

The A&M swim team is running in third and threatening to take over second place after the first day of the Southwest Conference meet. In jumping past second-seeded Texas the Aggies garnered two school records and qualified two swimmers and a relay team for the nationals.

The first event, the 500-yd. freestyle, Doug Meaden was tops for A&M, placing seventh in 4:49.27. Jim Yates was ninth.

In qualifying for the 200 yd. medley, Steve Moore broke the Aggie school record of 2:01.20. Then in prelims Steve Prentice lowered the mark again with a 1:59.18 but not to be out done Moore returned with a torpedo-like 1:58.85. Prentice finished third and Moore seventh while both qualified for nationals.

Scott Jones placed highest for A&M in the 50-yd. freestyle at ninth with a 22.18.

A&M's top diver, Duncan Cooper,

placed twelfth with 344.85 points.

The 400-yd. medley relay team upset Texas in a school record time of 3:37.82. The team broke the record in the prelims but lowered the mark in outdistancing the Longhorns.

SMU took over first place after one day's events with 253 points, with Arkansas a distant second with 88 gained mostly in diving events and a first in the 50-yd. free.

"They have good teamwork and spirit. They swim their butts off for the team," said coach Dennis Fosdick of the A&M swimmers.

Events starting tomorrow include the 200 free, 100 fly, 100 back, 100 breast, three-meter diving and several relays.

Cindermen travel to Houston meet

The A&M track squad travels to Houston Saturday for a triangular meet with Rice and the University of Houston.

The meet will be held on Rice's track which will be the site of the SWC track meet in May.

The Aggies are coming off a successful showing at the Border Olympics in Laredo last weekend where they finished third in team totals, winning two events and finishing second in three others.

One of the featured races is sure to be the 100-yard dash with A&M's Charles Dawson last week's winner in Laredo, favored to beat out Wayne Johnson of UH and Rice's Zoe Simpson. Johnson was second last week while Simpson defeated Dawson in a dual meet three weeks ago.

Dawson was having trouble gaining recognition until his victory in Laredo and now everyone seems to be looking at the sophomore transfer from Blinn Junior College.

Hurdler Scottie Jones is the other Aggie winner at the Border Olympics and he is heavily favored to take the 120-yard high. Jones has the best time in the conference thus far this season with a 14-0 ran two weeks ago. Houston's Freddie Lewis has a 14.4 to his credit while Mike Fulghum of Rice has run a 14.6. A&M's Shifton Baker and Richard McGilvray have best times of 14.3 and 14.6, respectively.

Baker has three top SWC marks in one field and two running

events. His high hurdles time is the third best mark in the conference while his best long jump effort of 22-10 1/4 is good for fourth and he also has the fourth top time in the 440-yard intermediate hurdles with a 53.1. He will be favored to take the long jump but UH's Larry Gnatzig, who edged out Baker in Laredo, get the nod in the intermediates.

Bill Newton, second place finisher last week in the javelin, should have no trouble in winning his specialty. His closest competitor will be Rice's Mike Fulghum who has managed to come no closer than 18 feet to Newton in competition this year.

A&M's Phil McGuire, coming off his season-best performance in Laredo, has got the edge in the high jump. McGuire has the best mark in the conference this year with a 6-9 jump but will get plenty of competition this weekend. Houston's Clifton Fruge and Dave McMenamin have both cleared 6-7 while Rice's Glenn Ray and Aggie Don Riggs each have a 6-5 leap to their credit.

A&M will be favored to take both relays with Houston providing the stiffest competition in the 440 and Rice pushing the Aggies in the mile.

Other featured performers for the Aggies will be Brad Blair and David Peterek in the pole vault, Doug Brodhead, Harold Davis Ron McGonigle in the 440-yard dash, Sam Dierschke and Carl Roaches in the sprints and Horace Grant in the 880-yard run.
