Engineering and accounting degree candidates are most sought by business and industrial employers.

They received 59 and 18 per cent, respectively, of offers re-ported in the CPC survey, announced Louis Van Pelt, placement director at A&M.

General business and marketing majors received 12 per cent of the remainder. Biological and physical science majors got six per cent and humanities and social

made to students in selected curricula and graduate programs. They reflect activity during the normal recruiting period of September to June.

The March report notes there is increased competition for engineering graduates, to whom 50 per cent more job offers were made than a year ago. Chemical engineers received the highest average offers, at \$1,021 a month. All engineering disciplines had five per cent or more increases.

New information center opens

Visitors at A&M can now get a quick overview of the institution's academic programs and related activities with a single stop at the new information center on the first floor of the Rudder Tower.

The new center, jointly supported by the university and the Association of Former Students. features multi-media presentations on each academic college and Corps of Cadets and a general production covering the overall institution. The TAMU story is told through a combination of color slides, movies and taperecorded messages. The academic college and Corps

of Cadets programs are presented through a series of stations featuring rear-projected color slides with telephone-type audio out-Student Programs Office in the lets. Each station can accommo-MSC. All applicants are asked to date three persons at one time, with the average presentation requiring eight minutes.

The production on the overall university is staged in an adjoining mini-theater with a threescreen capability.

Admissions and Records Dean Edwin H. Cooper said the information center should be of special interest and benefit to prospective students and their parentsparticularly if they visit the campus on weekends when most offices are closed.

The information center has been organized administratively under Dean Cooper and will function as an Admissions Office branch from which university applications, catalogues and related materials will be distributed.

Mrs. Arla Gammon has joined the university staff to coordinate activities at the new facility. In addition to being responsible for the center's daily operation, she will also help arrange campus tours.
