Hammerin' Hank nails No. 715

ATLANTA (AP)—Hank Aaron broke Babe Ruth's home run record Monday night hitting No. 715 in the fourth inning of a game between the Atlanta Braves and Los Angeles Dodgers.
The peerless Brave hit the second pitch from Dodger hurler Al Downing. Aaron had walked in his first trip to the plate.

"When he first hit it, I didn't think it would be gone but it kept carrying carrying," said Downing, moments after surrendering the historic homer.

Aaron hit the pitch out over the left field fence into the Braves bullpen, where Atlanta relief pitcher Tom House retrieved the ball and gave it back to Aaron.

Aaron had one ball on him when he connected for the historic home run, which cleared the fence just right of the 385-foot marker before an overflow hometown crowd in the 52,870 seat stadium.

After Aaron touched home

plate, teammates lifted him and carried him a few steps before the slugger broke away and trotted to a special box adjacent to the Atlanta dugout where he embraced his wife Billye, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Aaron of Mobile, Ala.

Soon after the 40-year-old slugger hit the homer, President Nixon phoned his congratulations. Aaron was in left field when the call came through but talked to the President between innings.

A spokesman for the Braves said he did not know what was said during the conversation.

Aaron's chase for the record

many thought unbreakable was surrounded by controversy in which Baseball Commissioner Bowie Kuhn had intervened twice. First Kuhn directed Atlanta to play Aaron in two of the three opening road games at Cincinnati. Then—after the slugger had tied the record Thursday with No. 714—ordered the Braves to play Aaron in the final road game.

The legendary Ruth played for 22 seasons, got into 2,503 games and had 8,399 at-bats in hitting 714 home runs. The soft-spoken Aaron is in his 21st season, and the record-breaker came on his 11,295th at-bat in his 2,967th

game.
The home run also brought Aaron across the plate for the 2,064th time in his career, a National League record and two runs ahead of Willie Mays in third place on the all-time run list for both leagues. Aaron also scored in the first inning after he had walked.

Netters drop two matches, face tough Mustangs today

The A&M tennis team suffered two defeats in three dual matches over the weekend to leave its record at 15-7 going into today's Southwest conference match with second-place SMU.

In College Station on Friday the Aggies demolished a strong Southwest Louisiana team 9-0, to up their dual match record to 15-5.

Tom Courson was the only Ag to have any trouble in singles as he had to take a tie-breaker in the first set but went on to win in straight sets.

The new top doubles team of Dan Courson and Mark Silberman had no trouble in downing Mark Schultz and Skipper Hunt in straight sets 6-2, 6-1.

The A&M team then traveled to Norman, Oklahoma, Saturday to take on Oklahoma University. The Sooners, ranked 16th in the nation and the team that the Aggies upset in the first round of the Corpus Christi tourney, withstood a heavy challenge from the Ags but prevailed 5-4.

A&M led 4-2 after singles on the strength of matches won by Senior Dan Courson and Freshmen Charles Emley, Silberman and Tom Courson.

Coach Omar Smith revamped the lineup somewhat to resemble that before the North Texas State match, with Bill Wright and Bill

Hoover playing the No.s 1 and 2 spots.

Hoover teamed with Dan Courson in the No. 1 doubles setup that was a runnerup in the Rice tourney to win the first set over Rick Lashley and Paul Lockwood, 6-4. The two Sooners though came back to take the second set at 6-2 and prevailed in the tie-breaker in the third set.

Tom Courson and Wright lost to Barr Baynton and Mike Newport in the second doubles, 2-6, 6-2, 6-2, while Emley and Silberman lost the third match to Dale Quigley and Mark Crozier, 6-3, 6-4.

Sunday in Oklahoma City the Ags managed to split singles with Oklahoma City University but again dropped all the doubles matches to go down 6-3.

The Aggie lineup was almost back to normal as Wright held down the top position, Hoover was second, and Dan Courson third. Freshmen Emley, Silberman and John Kirwan held the next three spots.

Wright was beaten by Steve Wedderburn 6-3, 6-7, 6-3 and Hoover won his match over OCU's Dennis Maddern 6-2, 7-5.

Dan Courson upped his season record to 16-3 with a win over Nondas Argiou, 6-4, 6-3.

John Kirwan took the last match 6-0, 7-5.

Hoover and Dan Courson won the tie-breaker in the first set but succumbed in the second and third, losing 6-3, 6-1.

The Aggies are in Dallas, today, to play SMU in a do or die match.

SMU, pre-season favorites for the title, dropped a heavy 6-1 decision to University of Houston on Saturday leaving Houston at the top of the conference with a 27-1 slate and an almost sure title.

SMU, who beat everyone to take the Rice tourney with every title at stake, boasts All-Americans in George Hardie and Tim Vann.

The Ags must take at least four matches to be in contention for fourth place. The Aggies are fighting Rice and Texas for spots in the top four.

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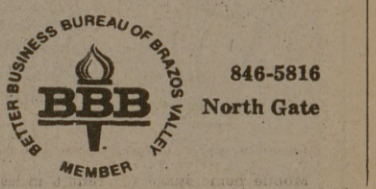
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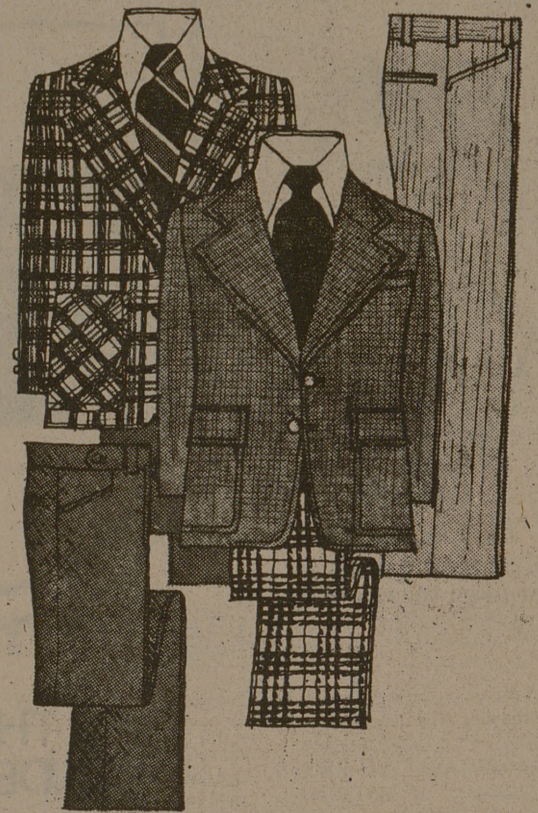


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
