A&M clobbers The Bunch again

The A&M water poloists made it the ninth win of the year against The Bunch of Houston, 9-1.

"It was close to a shutout," coach Dennis Fosdick said. The Ags keep leaving the goalies unaided and once a game is enough to let the opponents score. A&M beat The Bunch previously, 21-2.

In the first quarter of the game, the first team got five goals off the Houstonians, two by freshman Bob

Leland, two from senior Jim Yates and one from senior Steve Moore.

The second play of the quarter was the dream of any fast-break

coach, with a long pass from the Aggies' court end to wing Yates in-

to driver Moore and into the goal.

"The first team is shaping up and

doing things automatically. The second team was caught on the 45 second shot rule once, but this shows inexperience, having to stop and


think about what to do before it," Fosdick said.

Last weekend, the cross-country team competed against twelve other schools at the Arlington Invitational Meet.

Only four Aggie runners competed. The team did not place in the final standings.

The first A&M runner to finish was Jacob Yemme, who was 38th in running a 25:59 over the five-mile course.

Oklahoma State, a team to contend with at the NCAA Cross Country Championships in November, finished first with 34 points, making Oklahoma a distant second.

Jeff Wells of Rice was the individual winner with the fine time of 24:29.

The A&M team competes this Saturday in the 6-mile North Texas Invitational at Denton.

Congrats to the Consolidated football team for playing an excellent defensive game in punching to their first win of the season. The Tigers beat New Caney 12-0 Friday to up their record to 1-5.

The Tigers are 1-0 in zone play to put them in the lead. The win was the first for the Tigers in zone play in two years. The Tigers will face tough Navasota tonight at Tiger Field.

Meanwhile, the Bryan Vikings continue to rout the opposition boosting their record to 4-0-1. The Vikings ousted Waco University last week 41-6. The Vikings will take on the Cleburne Yellowjackets tonite trying to up their district slate to 3-0.

In five games this season, the Ags have been outscored in the first, third and fourth quarters, by three, six and three points, respectively. However the Ags have overcome the opposition in the second period 59-0. A&M has put 111 points on the board this season to the opponents' 64.

Al Thurmond, backup safety, and short man on punt returns got plenty of off-season practice against Tech weekend last. Thurmond, who plays outfield for the Aggies baseballers, called for four fair catches and finished with a perfect fielding average of 1.000.

Bubba Bean leads the conference in rushing with a 98 yards per game average. He is averaging 6.6 yards per carry. Skip Walker is second with 95.6 per game and 6.1 per carry. Bucky Sams is ninth at 72.6 and 5.0.

Mark Stanley leads the conference in punting with 28 kicks averaging 43.4 yards. Stanley is fifth in punting nationally.

David Walker is fourth in the conference in passing with 47.8 percent completions.

Bean and Skip Walker rank fourth and fifth in total offense, respectively with the same figures as their rushing norm. Total offense is the sum of rushing, receiving and return yardage.

Skip is second in the conference in tandem offense gaining 478 yards on the ground and snaring two receptions for 73 yards for a 551 total.

Skip also leads the conference and is seventh nationally in scoring with a 10.8 points per game average.
