Staff Writer Gen. A. R. Luedecke worked in the military and government before coming into the business of educa-



"I would like to have been an astronaut on the moon flights," Luedecke said. "I would even have liked to be in a position to take one of the first trips to Mars. Of course

As part of his official duties Luedecke is concerned with facilities planning and construction programs, he represents TAMU in several university associations which sponsor cooperative research projects and hears reports from four university committees. 
