Scruggs Revue

Band has new style

Grand Ole Opry banjo player Earl Scruggs will perform with the Earl Scruggs Revue Friday at 8 p.m. in G. Rollie White Coliseum.

Scruggs, who split with long-time partner Lester Flatt over the direction of their music to form his own band, has expanded his style since his Opry days.

He and the Revue now play blues, rock, jazz, modern country and pop, complete with electrified instruments and drums.

Scruggs' band includes three of

his sons. Gary Scruggs is lead singer and plays electric bass, harmonica and guitar. Randy Scruggs, who helps with composing and arranging, plays guitar, five-string banjo and bass. Scruggs' youngest son, Steve, plays bass and banjo but only performs when on vacation from school.

The other members of the band are Jody Maphis, drums, and Josh Graves, dobro guitar. Graves has been described by some as "the world's best dobro guitarist."

Scruggs and the Revue have ap-

peared frequently at concerts and festivals across the country. Perhaps the most momentous was their appearance at the Washington Moratorium for Peace in 1969.

Scruggs is being brought to A&M by the Town Hall Committee.

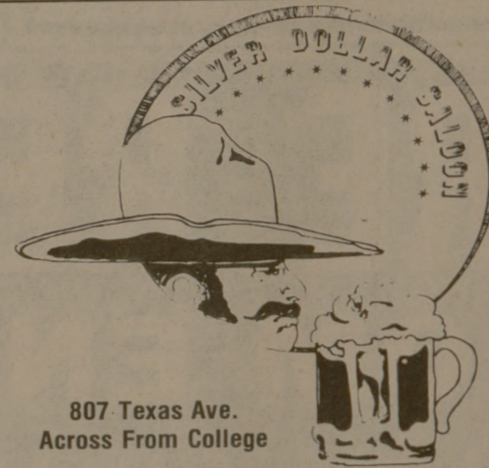
