
The administration expects about 4,000 more students next year, imbing to a student enrollment of bout 28,000 in the next few years. Williams also cited the increased lding power of the university that

eps the students coming back. "We love young people and that's why we're in the business," Wil-liams went on. "The University puts out people who do good works as well as just good students."

Williams was honored as the Joms' "Man of the Year." The 54 ggie Mothers Clubs are scattered cross the state boasting more than ,600 members. Most club acivities result in funds to support arious aspects of student life at TAMU.

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The executive meetings are also lanned for university leaders and other guests to help the mothers inderstand life at TAMU. Board embers also discussed federation and club projects for the coming year and other business matters.
